When they were first married Mr. and Mrs. Hodges went to live on the farm known as Lot 1, Con. 4, Walpole, and remained there for twenty-nine years. They then moved to Lot 1, Con. 11, of the same township, where they have since resided. Here it was that their four-score friends and relatives descended upon them, the gathering being a complete surprise for the bride of fifty years.
