Fisherville is to have Bus Service daily to Hamilton on schedule. The United Lines, Limited, have given out that they will establish service into Fisherville starting the first trip 6.45 a.m. November 17th between there and Hamilton. One trip a day will be given to start with, except on Saturdays and Sundays when two trips a day will be given. Later, it is anticipated, the traffic will justify a more frequent schedule than this.

Bus Service into Fisherville is badly needed, as Fisherville like Selkirk is an inland town without railroad facilities and will greatly appreciate transportation service of this kind.

The United Lines now are covering a great deal of territory south of Hamilton and touch many towns including Caledonia, Hagersville, Jarvis, Nelles Corners, Selkirk, Cayuga, York, Canfield, Canboro and Dunnville.
