

Proud Vessels Redisped to Scrap Metal

Lying in the mud on the foreshore of the Mersey is the ex-German submarine, the Deutschland, whose short, ingiorious period of active service ended with her surrender to England after the Armistice.

Costing \$500,000 to build, she frequently changed hands after being surrendered. Figuring in a recent law case and as the scene of a disastrous explosion in a Birkenhead shipyard, she has continued to bring trouble though stripped of armaments.

Now, completely gutted, she has been sold to the shipbreakers for \$1,000. "Cut her up for scrap," is the terse order that precedes her consignment to the furnace. Piece by piece, each five feet by two feet, is carved from the body by the piercing jet of the oxy-acetylene blowpipe. Even with this wonderful device it is a big task, for, with characteristic German thoroughness, the double shell of the submarine is stiffened and braced in every direction.
