German offer on reparations to remain good.

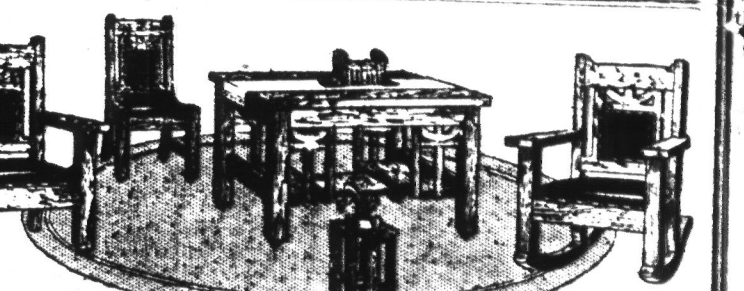
