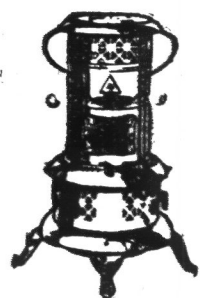

**WEDNESDAY.**

Diegel defeats Abe Mitchell in golf play-off.  
Former Kaiser's wedding to be held at Doorn November 5.  
Ontario Fire Agents Association is in convention at Toronto.  
British glider remains in air two hours at Hford Hill meet.  
Cutting rights on two Northwest-ern Ontario pulp limits leased by the Government.  
Herbert Wilson, former evangelist and convicted murderer, escapes from Los Angeles jail.  
Young man instantly killed in bush near Cornwall by companion who fires at squirrel.  
Sarnia storekeepers complain that smuggling by women is seriously affecting their business.  
Joseph del Genio, a Toronto Italian, is freed by confidence men for \$1,460, his two years' savings.  
First real blizzard of the season reaches head of lakes and boats are hunting shelter from the storm.  
Money collected by the Provincial Government this year under the tax on race-tracks wakers totalled \$2,212,220.
