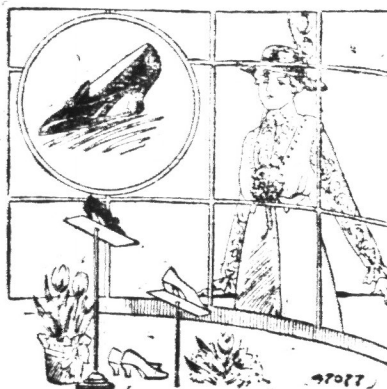

## CLOSED THE CONSULATE

United States Officials Abuse Their Positions.

Drastic Action Taken by the British Government at Newcastle-on-Tyne and Washington Authorities Retaliate by Closing Their Consulates—An Unprecedented Action.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—On order of the United States Government, the American Consulate at Newcastle-on-Tyne closed on Aug. 31. This sensational development followed the revocation of the exequatur of Fred C. Slater, consul, and Russell M. Brooks, vice-consul, by the British Government for alleged abuse of their consular positions to the disadvantage of British interests.

How soon the United States Government means to reopen the Newcastle consulate is a matter of conjecture. The two consular officials who have had exequaturs revoked have been assigned to posts elsewhere. Slater, who is said to have been one of the most efficient consular officials in the service, has been given a post in Spain, while Vice-Consul Brooks has gone to Germany. There is no demotion in their new appointments.

It is understood that the United States Government to close a consulate after the cancellation of exequaturs of any of its consular representatives. It leads to the belief that the authorities in Washington have thus administered a rebuke to Great Britain for her action.

From what the correspondent has been able to ascertain, the British Government some weeks ago filed with the State Department alleged proofs that Slater and Brooks had refused visas to persons desiring to go to the United States unless they went on United States ships. It is within the power of any Government to revoke exequaturs without giving reasons, but in this instance charges were lodged.

There is much mystery as to who made the charges against the consular agents to the British Government. It is from what can be learned from British shipping interests are at the bottom of it. With the United States Government practically in the shipping business, all consular officials are said to have the right to bring to the notice of persons intending to go to America the fact that American vessels are in the passenger service.

Out of this is said to have grown the charges that visas were refused unless the intending travelers of British nationality went by American vessels.

It was said further that one steamship company which represents not only American but other lines, recently took office in the building in which the American consulate is situated and that this led to criticism by some of the British interests that the consulate was working directly with this agency.

Cancellation of the exequaturs of the American consular officials at Newcastle is the first to arise as a result of alleged boosting of American shipping by American consular officials, and therefore it is of great importance.

The effect of the closing of one of the most important American consulates in the United Kingdom is bound to be far reaching. It will mean that great shipping interests there will have to go to Hull to obtain visas and it is certain that if the United States Government does not reopen the Newcastle consulate it will result in a loss of thousands of dollars to this big shipping center and will lead to much pressure being brought to bear upon the British Government to ask for the re-opening of this consulate.

## LENINE IS RECOVERING.

Carried Bullet In His Body for Three Years.

MOSCOW, Sept. 5.—Nicolai Lenine has fully recovered from his recent illness and is planning to address the Communist Congress late in the autumn.

He was the recipient on Thursday of many visits and floods of messages, the occasion being the fourth anniversary of the attempt made on his life by Fanny Kaplan. One of the bullets she sent into his body aggravated the cause of his recent breakdown.

Lenine carried a bullet for more than three years, and it was removed last April. No official bulletin was published.

Ivanoff, the factory worker, who captured Fanny Kaplan, told me of the shooting. "I was outside the Grey-Muchelson factory," he said, "and saw the car of Lenine standing waiting for him. He came out of the factory after addressing a meeting and was stopped by a nurse named Stockton, who asked him why bread meant for hospitals had been requisitioned."

"Five feet away stood the Kaplan girl. She pointed a revolver at Lenine and fired twice, then threw the gun away and ran. I followed and caught her. A crowd threatened her, but she was taken away."

Many Miners Killed.

CUMBERLAND, B.C., Sept. 5.—Fifteen men were killed and 16 injured in the explosion which occurred Thursday afternoon in number four mine of the Canadian Collieries Dunsmuir coal properties. All of the bodies have been recovered. The dead are: Robert Dunsire, John Johansson, John Gibson, seven Japanese and five Chinese. Hospital authorities state that all of the injured are likely to recover.

Miss E. Bellotti, a nurse, insisted on accompanying Dr. W. Hicks and the rescue party, which went down into the mine, although warned of the possibility of another explosion. Her heroic work among the injured was praised on all sides.

## CROP WILL BE LARGE

Westerners Are Expecting to Break Past Records.

Although the Yield of Wheat is Not as Large Per Acre as in 1915, the Total Will Surpass That of the Famous First War Year Crop—Estimate Made by Experts for the Manitoba Free Press.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 5.—Exceeding all previous figures forecasted by various authoritative bodies this year, the Manitoba Free Press, in its nineteenth annual crop estimate for the three Prairie Provinces estimates the wheat yield this year at 371,901,000 bushels from a total acreage of 21,471,000 acres.

During the growing period of the crop there have been comparisons made with the famous crop of 1915, the paper says, when the total yield of wheat of the Prairie Provinces was 360,187,000 bushels from 13,847,715 acres. It is only necessary to compare these figures to realize that while the present crop of wheat in the Prairie Provinces is the largest ever produced in the west from point of average yield, it falls very far below 1915.

Previous estimates made this year have varied from 297,741,000 bushels to 359,000,000, the former being the Dominion Bureau of Statistics estimate, based on conditions at the end of July, and the latter the Grain Trade News estimate.

This year's Free Press estimate would average 17.31 bushels to the acre, while the banner year, 1915, the average was 25.97 bushels.

Other grain yields in the Prairie Provinces this year are estimated as follows: Oats, 413,539,000 bushels (10,861,000); barley, 61,080,000 bushels (2,053,400); rye, 54,311,000 bushels (2,329,000); flax, 3,088,000 bushels (52,290).

The newspaper calls attention to the fact that the crop of 1922 has been produced in a shorter period of time than almost any crop in the history of the Prairie Provinces, in many districts not more than 102 days elapsing between seeding of wheat and cutting.

The season of 1922 emphasizes in a marked degree some of the wonderful recuperative powers of the Prairie Provinces, the Free Press says. Over very large wheat acres in Saskatchewan, after an unduly delayed seeding, no general rain fell for ninety-nine days, and in spite of this, on the cultivated lands already yields have been threshed that run from 25 to 30 bushels, though these, of course, are not general in these districts. The paper also calls attention to the recovery of the section of St. Lawrence street level railway between the city and the station, after a tremendous hail damage in June, and also to the reversal of moisture conditions.

Threshing is general throughout the entire length and breadth of the Prairie Provinces and threshing in northern districts is generally from two to three weeks earlier than it has been for many years, the paper says. Labor up to the present has not been unduly short and farmers adhering very closely to wage rates agreed on. Never in the history of the west have the railways been in a better position to move the crop in the matter of cars, the Free Press says. Throughout the west on both systems every siding was full of cars before the middle of August, and early movement should be entirely satisfactory.

During crop inspection, the agricultural editor of the Free Press motor-ed considerably over 4,000 miles in addition to many hundred miles of train journey.

Accident at Level Crossing.

OTTAWA, Sept. 5.—Hector Quette, aged 14 years, of Hull, was instantly killed, and four others were injured, two of them critically, at the St. Flourant street level railway crossing in Hull, when a motor truck in which they were riding was struck by two C. P. R. engines travelling double-headed towards Ottawa.

The engines, which were driven by P. Stowick, a Guelph, and Fireman R. Nolan, Ottawa, struck the front part of the truck, turning it over and grinding the body under its wheels, so that the tender became derailed and tore up part of the right-of-way, all clearing the engine with the exception of young Quette. At the point where the accident occurred the view is somewhat obstructed by a short row of trees, and it is believed that the driver of the motor car did not hear the engine signal for the crossing.

Punished His Brother.

BELGRADE, Sept. 5.—King Alexander has deprived his brother, Prince George, of all communication with the royal house for a period of 30 months for making untrue allegations calculated to damage the interests of the state. During this time he will be required to live at Nish.

Prince George, who is 35 years old, or a year the senior of his brother, renounced his rights as Crown Prince of Serbia in 1909. Late in June of the present year, while George was living in Paris, he was accused by M. Pachitch, the Yugoslav Premier, with writing menacing letters. This, however, was later denied by the Yugoslav Legation at the French capital.

Trappist Was Stabbed.

NEWCASTLE, N.B., Sept. 5.—John Sullivan was arrested at Rogersville Friday and brought to Newcastle, charged with stabbing Rev. Father Timothy, a member of the Trappist Order, in the cemetery Thursday morning. Father Timothy was stabbed in the face, the knife penetrating to the mouth and cutting the tongue. The wound is a severe one, but is not expected to prove serious.
