**Bus Service for School Children Probable**  
United Lines May Put on Special Bus For Them  
Welcome news to the school children in Jarvis and on the road between Jarvis and Hagersville comes in an announcement that the United Lines, Limited, plans to put on a special morning and afternoon bus between Jarvis and Hagersville to take care of the school travel.  
If the special bus is put on, it is understood, it will leave Jarvis about 8 A. M., and returning leave Hagersville after the last class in the afternoon, around 4 P. M. This will give splendid service for the school children.  
Statistics, it is understood, show that in territory where good bus service is given to school children, that school attendance is increased from forty to fifty per cent.  
The United Lines, Limited is now giving special service to the High School and Robinson Business College students at Dunnville. The service runs from Canfield, Canboro, and way points into Dunnville every morning and out again in the afternoon after the last class. The bus picks the students up along the way in the morning, getting them to school at a convenient hour before the first class, and returning, drops them off at home that afternoon without unnecessary waiting after school is out to get home.  
It is to be hoped that the United Lines can see their way clear to establish this service throughout the school season.
