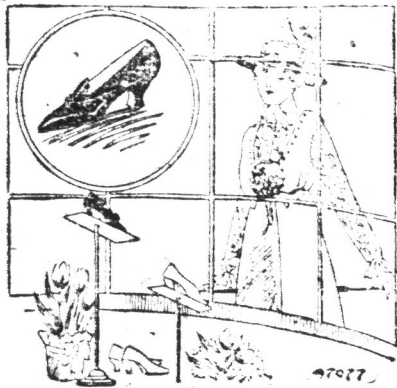

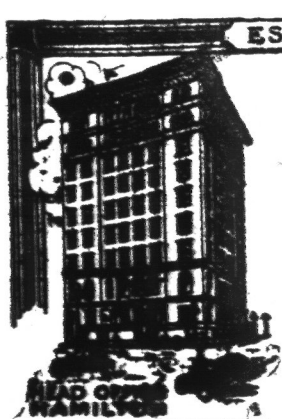

TURKS MAY CAUSE WAR

Victorious Armies Threaten to Return to Europe.

Kemalists Declare That They Will Attack Neutral Zones in the Dardanelles Unless Permitted to Occupy Larace — Britain Calls on Overseas Dominions to Send Men.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—Great Britain has invited Canada and the other British Dominions to be represented by contingents in the British force taking part in an effective defence of the neutral zone in the Near East.

The British Government has also addressed a note to Roumania, Jugoslavia and Greece, seeking their participation in the defence.

The semi-official announcement of the invitation to the Dominions said that they had been invited to participate "in the defence of those interests for which they have already made enormous sacrifices."

The announcement followed the semi-official statement that the British Government has adopted the attitude that the effective and permanent freedom of the Dardanelles is a vital necessity.

The British Government insists that the Straits affect British interests, European interests and world interests of the first order. Satisfaction is expressed that the British views are shared by France and Italy, which are the other two great powers principally concerned.

The complete unity of the allies has created confidence here of a successful approach to the solution of the Near East complications. While this unity exists, Kemal is not expected to attempt any offensive action which would involve his forces in military conflict with the allies.

The British Government has noted with great satisfaction the prompt response of the Australian and New Zealand Governments to the invitation to share in the defence, if necessary, of the Gallipoli Peninsula.

Active steps are being taken to complete the organization of the strong allied forces, naval and military, to enforce the continued neutrality of the Bosphorus and Dardanelles, and the immediate concentration of these forces at critical points may be looked for.

There is very little direct news from Smyrna and it is not yet certain that all British inhabitants have been evacuated safely. It was known that most of them had got away, but with the loss of their effects.

No further meeting of the Cabinet has been called at present. The Prime Minister returns to London to-day. It may be taken that there is no longer any probability that Lloyd George will be able to visit the Geneva Conference of the League of Nations.

Canadian Veterans Stand Ready to Do Their Part.

QUEBEC, Sept. 19.—At a meeting of the Royal Rifles of Canada, held at noon Monday, it was unanimously resolved that all the officers of the unit offer their services for any military operation required. The resolution was transmitted to the local military headquarters to be forwarded to Ottawa. The Royal Rifles is composed mostly of French-speaking people of this city. On the other hand Col. C. A. Chauveau, O.C. of the Voltigeurs Canadian, a unit exclusively composed of French-Canadians and the other officers of the unit have called a meeting for similar purposes. At a special meeting of No. 5 company signallers, held Sunday evening the same offer has also been extended.

MONTREAL, Sept. 19.—The Dominion command of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association, whose headquarters are in Montreal, wired to Ottawa Monday morning placing at the disposal of the Dominion Government the entire veterans' organization for co-operation in every possible way.

RECEIVE ENLISTMENTS.
KINGSTON, Sept. 19.—The local veterans association, the army and navy and the great war veterans have arranged to receive enlistments of men for the near east, and already a large number of men have left their names with the association, while many have left their names at military headquarters.

JUST WAITING DECISION.
FREDERICTON, N.B., Sept. 19.—The York Regiment is available in whole or in part if Canada decides to send troops to the Near East in answer to the request of the British Government for a contingent. Major Alton Sterling, commanding officer of the York Regiment, sent telegrams this afternoon to the general officer commanding the New Brunswick military district at St. John and also to the Minister of Militia at Ottawa.

TORONTO, Sept. 19.—Invitation to join in holding back the Turk from Europe found many war veterans in Toronto ready to do the uniform that had been laid aside after the battalions returned from France in 1919.

The possibility of the ranks reforming for a new campaign brought inquirers—eager to enlist—hurrying to the Armories, military headquarters and the veterans' organization Monday morning. By noon over 400 men, mostly veterans of the great war, had called at the Armories and enquired at the orderly rooms of the various regiments if any word had been received from Ottawa.

The local office of the Great War Veterans' Association has received telephone calls from a large number of ex-servicemen of all ranks offering to enlist if a local battalion is formed to be rushed to the Dardanelles according to J. V. Conroy, secretary of the association.

One of Mr. Conroy's sons, Capt. J. B. Conroy, is now serving with an imperial unit at Constantinople. He enlisted in 1914, and was with them until the war ceased, having been twice wounded in France. His unit has been billeted at Constantinople since 1920.

WILL NOT BE HASTY.

Canadian Government is Considering Call to Arms.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19.—It remains for the Cabinet of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King to decide whether or not Canada shall accept the invitation of the Imperial Government to participate in the war impending in the near east. But it will rest with Parliament ultimately to approve or veto whatever decision is reached. The responsibility is primarily upon the administration for the framing of a policy in the circumstances. It is inconceivable, however, that such policy unless negative shall be put into effect without consultation in Parliament of the representatives of the people throughout the whole of Canada.

So far Premier King has declined to divulge the nature of communications from Great Britain asent the new crisis. The Cabinet was summoned to meet in council at noon on Monday. No precipitate decision, for several reasons, however, will be reached and it is quite improbable that any announcement will be made for some days to come. Should the decision be momentous in character announcement of it would be first made to Parliament.

The Cabinet adjourned just before two o'clock without reaching any decision regarding the British Government's invitation to send troops to the defence of the Dardanelles.

Premier King saw newspaper men after adjournment and stated that there was nothing he could announce at present. As the message from the British Government was marked confidential, he could not make it public without permission from that Government, and he would not even say whether or not it had been correctly interpreted by the newspapers. He stated, however, that the official message had not contained sufficient information for a decision by the Government, and that additional information was being called for.
