**Water and Truck Line**  
United Lines, Ltd., Planning For The Future—A Progressive Corporation—All Towns on Their Lines Will Greatly Benefit  
A water and truck line shipping route is soon to be afforded the farmers, merchants and shippers generally in this community, according to reports.  
The Kirkwood Steamship Lines of Montreal has been in Hamilton, the past week negotiating for dock facilities with a view of bringing their lines into Hamilton.  
The Hamilton Chambers Commerce having been largely instrumental in prevailing upon the United Lines, to launch a large Ship-by-Truck System and Bus Service in the territory tributary to Hamilton, is now understood to be bending its efforts to secure a new Steamship Line into Hamilton. This will afford the Ship-by-Truck Company an opportunity to quote a water and truck line rate and through tariff from points in this community direct through to points east of Toronto to Montreal giving the same character of service that the railroads give over their water and rail routes.  
The decided advantage of the truck services to the farmers, merchants, and shippers generally, however, is that it gives such faster service.  
The United Lines plan to start their service with twenty-five 3-ton trucks with some lighter and faster ones. With this service the different towns and communities in the fifty mile radius of Hamilton can be linked up with the water lines at Hamilton.  
Freight will be collected by the trucks in the afternoon and delivered the following morning to the steamship dock.  
When the fleet of trucks is increased the area of operations will be extended proportionately, the aim being to cover the entire territory that in any way desires traffic moved toward Hamilton or Toronto.  
A large freight depot will be established in one of the most accessible parts of Hamilton, which will serve as a clearing house.  
Heavier trucks will run on the longer routes, while the light ones will mostly be utilized for the shorter routes and dirt roads.

**Good Interest Returns**  
The attention of the holders of the five and a half per cent war loan bonds maturing December 1, 1922, is directed to the offer of the Minister of Finance to renew the loan on favourable terms. The last Canadian loan was placed in New York at a satisfactory price. The Minister is making his present financial operation entirely a domestic one by offering to exchange the maturing bonds for new bonds bearing the same rate of interest, running for either five or ten years as the bondholder may prefer. A further inducement to the investor is that he receives a bonus of one month's interest. The terms offered are decidedly favourable to the investor and it is probable that a large part of the maturing loan will be renewed. Arrangements for the exchange of the bonds can be made at any branch of the chartered banks. Holders who do not wish to reinvest will be paid in cash on the 1st December.
