**TURKS BACK IN EUROPE**

May Also be Permitted to Join League of Nations.

Nationalists of Turkey Have Scored Over the Allies, and Great Britain, France and Italy in Conference. Unanimously Agree to Concede All Kemalist Peace Terms.

PARIS, Sept. 26.—The return of Turkey to Europe was assured Saturday night, when Britain, France and Italy, at the final session of the allied conference, unanimously agreed to concede all the Nationalist peace terms. The Turkish claims to Eastern Thrace, to the Maritza river, and including the ancient Turkish capital of Adrianople, were approved as peace terms that can be supported by France, Britain and Italy in a joint invitation sent to Mustafa Kemal Pasha, the Nationalist leader, to a peace conference to be held at Venice at the earliest possible date.

The Kemalists must agree, in return, not to enter the present neutral zone along the Straits, nor make any crossing elsewhere, and must accept complete freedom of the Dardanelles, the Sea of Marmora and the Bosphorus preferably under the League of Nations.

The invitation, which was cabled by M. Poincare to Kemal Pasha, personally, urges an immediate meeting of Allied and Turkish and Greek generals at Moudada, to formulate terms of an armistice, pending the conference. It is regarded as virtually certain that Kemal will accept the conditions, and a reply is expected from Smyrna in a day or two.

In addition to other concessions, Turkey is promised the support of the three Allies for admission to the League of Nations, and also withdrawal of the Allied troops from Constantinople as soon as peace becomes effective.

The Allied decision came as a big surprise, for as late as noon Sunday British officials declared that Britain would not approve any of the Turkish claims in advance of the peace conference. The change in this policy came in the afternoon after an exchange of many messages between Lord Curzon and Premier Lloyd George and several long telephone conversations, which delayed the final session from two o'clock to five.

Although the British insist that their chief demand, mainly freedom of the Straits, is embodied in the conditions, it is generally conceded that this unanimous decision marks a reversal of policy on the part of Great Britain, and is considered here a victory for French diplomacy. M. Poincare expressed the belief that the Near East crisis is over and that all danger of a clash is past.

It is assumed that the British troops will remain at Chanak pending the peace conference. A broad neutral zone will divide Eastern Thrace from Greece and Bulgaria in the treaty terms which will be decided at the conference. Both Yugoslavia and Roumania insisted upon this provision before they consented to the return of Turkey to Europe, although it is not mentioned in the treaty terms, which are being drafted by the Turkish military forces in Thrace and Adrianople will be rigidly limited, and that the strictest guarantees will be exacted for the Greek minorities in these places.

The probability of a Turkish attack on the British position at Chanak was given as a reason why the joint note was cabled immediately after the conference Sunday night.

That with the Allied decision granting the Turkish claims in the hands of Kemal Pasha, the Nationalist leader could influence his warlike associates to await calmly the outcome of the peace conference.

The Turkish abandonment by Britain of her position was due, it is believed, to a desire to avoid war, which many British officials, both at home and in the Near East, regarded as likely. Pressure from British labor, which was united against hostilities in the Near East, is also thought to have played no small part in the decision of the British Government.

Having effectively obtained in the decision freedom of the Straits, Britain is said to have reasoned that to insure peace in the Near East it would be better not to withhold any longer Turkish aspirations to a foothold in Europe, provided ample guarantees were exacted which would prevent a Turkish-Bulgarian alliance directed against the Balkan countries.

While agreeing virtually to all the Turkish claims, Lord Curzon insisted upon preservation of the neutral zone on the Asiatic side of the Straits. The pledge is exacted from Kemal to observe these zones and not to cross the Straits or the Sea of Marmora until peace is signed.

The previous contention of Great Britain that allied troops should continue to occupy Gallipoli is not mentioned in the note, but it is probable that a small allied force will remain temporarily on the Peninsula.

The Greek forces are to retire from Eastern Thrace and Adrianople to a line to be fixed by the allied generals in agreement with the Greek and Turkish military authorities. The meeting to arrange an armistice is expected to be held at Moudana within a few days. Admission of Turkey to the League of Nations, which the allies pledge themselves to support, is not expected until the assembly meeting of next year.

**Save Brusa From Torch.**

LONDON, Sept. 26.—The Greek General Staff has decided to burn the town of Brusa. Reuters' Constantinople correspondent says he learned today. It was only the strong representation of the French Consulate and Italian officers which led Gen. Soumhas to countermand the order.

**TREATY IS NOW SAFE.**

Free State Party Has No Fear of Opposition.

BELFAST, Sept. 26.—The Irish Parliament lost no time in getting to work on the Free State constitution. It is already evident that any attempt to obstruct it will fail and that the constitution will be completed by the required date. The knowledge that by the terms of the treaty the work must be finished by December 6 or the treaty lapse, provoked apprehension in the minds of the treaty's friends, but in Parliament the Government is faced with no serious opposition. The House does not contain one professed opponent of the treaty.

There are many members dissatisfied with several provisions of the constitution, but the Government has met the situation by leaving them free to alter it at will while insisting rigidly on such parts of it as are necessary to fulfil the treaty obligations. The Government has not only adequate support in the division in the lobbies from a steady majority but is aided in transacting business by the willingness of its supporters to refrain from oratory. Less than half dozen critics, mostly from the Labor benches, attacked the treaty, the Ministry replying briefly and the debate ends promptly.

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The second man in the Government is Kevin O'Higgins, the Home Secretary, who imitates Cosgrave. He is a grandson of T. D. Sullivan, one of the founders of the Parnell movement, and though well under thirty, shows all the aptitude of a skilled politician. He will pilot the constitution bill through Parliament and as he was accustomed to accompany Griffith and Collins to London for conferences with the British Ministry, he knows all the danger points vital to the treaty on which he says the Government will stand or fall.

**SITUATION HAS IMPROVED.**

Deficit of the Government Railways Not So Large.

OTTAWA, Sept. 26.—Operations of the Canadian Railways for the first six months of the present year, compared with the corresponding period of last year, show an improvement. There is still a deficit on operation, but it has been cut in half in comparison with the operation deficit for the period from January to the end of June, 1921. In the six months of 1921 the operation deficit was \$15,169,450; this year it is \$8,928,393.

In the six months of last year, the Canadian National Railways spent \$1.28 for every dollar earned in revenue; this year, they have expended \$1.17, as the operation deficit does not, of course, include fixed charges; nor do the above figures include the Grand Trunk, which has an operating surplus for the six months of 1922 of \$4,200,946, a considerable improvement over the six months of 1921, \$1,326,735, the operating surplus of the corresponding period of last year, \$1,326,735. The Grand Trunk has expended 87 cents for every dollar earned; last year, it expended 96 cents.

With reduced rates and lighter passenger traffic, the operating deficit of the Canadian National Railways for the six months fell off \$6,871,806, or 11.1 per cent. But the payroll was reduced \$1,409,270, or 16.5 per cent. Total expenses were reduced \$3,133,602,250, or 18.5 per cent., causing the operating deficit to diminish \$7,280,452.

For the six months, the Grand Trunk showed an increase in freight traffic of 8.4 per cent., but a decrease in passenger traffic of 9.9 per cent. Lower rates produced freight revenues 2 per cent. below last year's and passenger revenues 15.7 per cent. less. Total revenues decreased \$2,000,151, or 5.5 per cent., but operating expenses were reduced \$4,874,362, or 13.9 per cent., giving a net operating revenue of \$4,200,946.

**BANDIT ADMITS GUILT.**

Throw Up His Hands After His Trial Started.

SARNIA, Sept. 26.—With unexpected suddenness the trial of Edward McMullen, alleged bandit leader, came to a close in the fall assizes Monday afternoon, when McMullen withdrew his previous plea of "not guilty" and entered one of "guilty."

McMullen's confession followed the withdrawal of J. M. McEvoy, who had acted as defence counsel, from the case.

With Mr. Justice Lennox presiding, the case against McMullen had been ready opened when the accused man made his confession. Harvey Lambert, manager of the Bank of Toronto, and in the witness box, when McMullen suddenly beckoned to W. E. Haney, his counsel. After a whispered conference, Mr. Haney announced that McMullen wished to plead guilty. Questioned by the judge, the prisoner himself confirmed the statement. Sentence was deferred by the judge until the cases of George Anderson and John Yohn, McMullen's alleged accomplices in the robbery, are proceeded with. His lordship instructed the jury to find McMullen guilty, and then dismissed them.

McMullen will be arraigned on a charge of jail breaking as soon as a true bill is returned by the grand jury.

The charge to which he pleaded guilty was robbery with violence.

Later in the afternoon McMullen also pleaded guilty to a charge of attempted jail breaking, on which court sentence was also deferred.

**Utilizing Unmarketable Potatoes.**

Unmarketable potatoes add succulence to the dairy ration. Where corn silage is not available and there are plenty of small potatoes, a peck a day will give an increase in milk flow. They should be introduced into the ration gradually and be run through a root cutter to avoid the possibility of choking the animal.

**A Good Whitewash.**

Stake one-half bushel of fresh lime with boiling water, covering the receptacle to keep in the steam. Strain the liquid through a fine sieve, and add seven pounds of fine salt, previously dissolved in warm water; three pounds of ground rice, boiled to a thin paste and stirred in; one peck of white glue, soaked first in cold water until swollen, then carefully melted over fire.

To this mixture add five gallons of hot water and let it stand covered for a few days before using.
