Important Events Which Have Occurred During the Week.

WEDNESDAY.

U.S. tariff bill passed by Senate. U.S. tariff bill from fire in Smyrna is \$1,006,999. United States will stand aloof in Near East crisis. Kilties win and Browns lose in the American League. J. E. O. Brennan, of Deseronto, is killed by falling tree. British labor to hold demonstration in London against war. A. K. Ripenski is drowned while fishing in Hamilton Bay. Four candidates will contest the Pas by-election in Manitoba. "Jake" Stahl, former manager of the Boston Red Sox, is dead. House of Industry trustees will urge plan of old age pensions. President Harding vetoes soldiers' bonus bill passed by Congress. No alteration in liquor law except by vote of people, says Mr. Raney. The Irish Parliament gives women franchise on same footing as men. Campaign in Cairo is in progress to stop operations of murder gang. Church of England will hold annual congress at Sheffield, England. There were several aspects in Canadian women's closed golf tournament. The Woodbine fall meeting opened with an attendance of about 20,000. Two and a half million dollars required for Methodist extension work. Experts are examining Commons chamber to correct acoustic defects. Third annual convention of Canadian Deep Waterways Association is held in Welland. German yachtsmen Reichbank's willingness to endorse reparations bonds. If embargo is removed, British market will only take best type of Canadian feeders, and not all year round. Two women and two small children knocked down by motor cars and street cars in Toronto. One woman may die.

Hornby makes 39th home run. Pittsburg Pirates defeat Giants, 4 to 1. Branch of Hong Kong Bank to be located in Toronto. U. S. Tariff Act becomes effective at midnight to-night. Six stores entered and looted in Oshawa in one night. Orangville beat Bradford and Mimico defeated Sarnia. Irish women disturb proceedings of Free State Parliament. Shipment of Lehigh Valley anthracite arrives at Toronto. Harry Dent found guilty of murder at Brantford Assizes. Ten women are enrolled in Toronto college to study dentistry. Powers will make loan to Austria to tide her over two years. Standpat railway in U. S. refuse to negotiate with shopmen. Trade Commissioner Ross reports improved conditions in China. Allan Crawford of Toronto believed held in Arctic by failure of relief vessel. Maurice Barrie found guilty of murdering Wesley Mout, in Hastings county. Viscount Grey issues warning against quarrel with France over Turkey. Fifteen-year-old boy, near Greenbank, thrown from horse and instantly killed. Wm. Dupuis is found not guilty by jury at Chatham on charge of manslaughter. Telephone wire falling across high tension line electrocutes lineman in St. Thomas. Exterminator wins Autumn Cup for third successive year at Woodbine opening. Important announcement expected regarding transportation problems in West Toronto. Toronto Italians commemorate the fall of Rome and establishment of Italian kingdom. Sir Robert Falconer speaks of Trinity College affiliation with University of Toronto. Ben Shapiro tells Toronto police two men walked into his store, and snatching \$2,700 from his hand, ran away with it. Ontario's Agent-General advocates bringing English boys to Canada in units and establishing them in army huts under Scout masters.

Muir, pioneer of East Zorra, died suddenly at his home. Sadi Lecolte, French flyer, beats world's velocity record in air. Irish House of Parliament passes second reading of constitution. Thousands of travelers held at Marseilles owing to strike of seamen. Two Indians at Chatham given penitentiary terms for manslaughter. Grand Army of United Veterans hold annual meeting at Niagara Falls. Montreal coroner blames Germany for flooding Canada with narcotic drugs. Nineteen U. S. railroads make peace with striking shopmen on Baltimore basis plan. Astronomers take successful observations of the eclipse of the sun at Woolial, Australia. Rear Admiral Sims, U. S. navy, will visit Toronto, Montreal and Port Hope in November. Timber limit of 70 square miles east of Port Arthur disposed of to W. T. McEachron. Sovereign Grand Lodge of Odd-fellows refuses to permit use of foreign languages in lodges.

SATURDAY.

Giants beat Pirates, 8 to 7. Leads defeat Rochester, 15 to 11. Five persons injured in motor car Toronto yesterday. Library for boys and girls will be opened in Toronto. Mrs. Gibson wins Canadian golf final from Miss Fagot. Greeks will reconvene assembly and call national assembly. Jewish New Year festival with impressive ceremonies. Impassioned Government would Landmans Bank immediately. Irish rebels hurt seriously with deadly effect in Irish capital. Four murders at Comstock Gulf are reported to Mounted Police. Hydroplane on forest survey work in Quebec is wrecked, but no lives are lost. Second crop of strawberries and raspberries make appearance at Milton. Emil Picarillo, alleged slayer of Alberta constable, is captured at Blairmore. Washington officials say there will be no discrimination against Canada on arms contracts. Dominions and small European nations want Turkish question left to League of Nations. Conservative leader says Canada should back up the Mother Country in her dispute with Turkey. 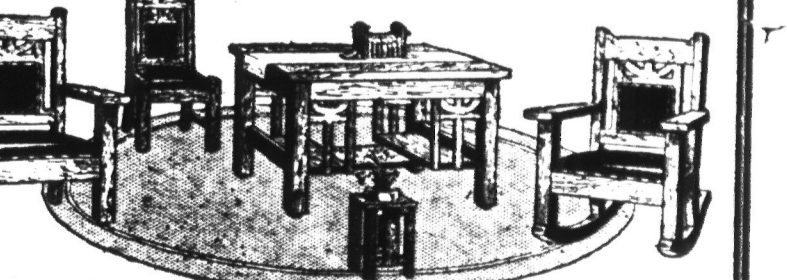
