## IN THE RANTO HOUSE

Toronto, April 5.—(Name withheld) yesterday about the problem of making this week that Premier Doherty has abandoned his intention of any minister in delaying it. Mr. Black declared that he would. Sessions resumed on Tuesday, after the Easter adjournment, and found members not all prepared for continuation of the budget debate. One from each group spoke, and debate was then adjourned by Wellington Hay on behalf of Thomas Marshall, Lincoln. Mr. Hay remarked that he understood it to be the premier's wish that the debate conclude next Wednesday. Before that time, all three party leaders are to speak.

T. F. Slack of Dufferin, who contributed an address of an hour, made the unique suggestion that the Government establish a radio broadcasting station, and provide receiving from university professors and educators might hear addresses and lectures in the schools, so that papistical authorities. The cost, he thought, would not be prohibitive.

Mr. Slack also protested vigorously against the practice of ignoring "Canadian" as a nationality in the filling out of such documents as the birth certificates, etc. "American" is recognized over the border, he pointed out, notwithstanding other racial origin, and he thought Canadian children ought to be so recognized from birth. Hon. H. C. Nixon, provincial secretary, pointed out that a Dominion regulation was responsible, but Mr. Slack said he would violate it, if necessary, and believed the people of Canada would uphold such action.

**The Agriculture Development Act**  
Involved the long-term loan scheme, occupied most of Tuesday evening in discussing the amendments proposed by Hon. Manning Doherty. Criticism chiefly centres about a new clause (g) which extends the purposes for which farm loans may be made to that of "consolidating outstanding liabilities." The minister have so far rather denied the contention that this opens the door wide to loaning for any purpose at all, but J. C. Brown, U.F.O. member for North Middlesex, admitted to Hon. G. St. Henry that that was his own view of it though he held there was still the restriction that loans must be for "productive purposes." Hon. St. Henry thought a man could take the money and go on a trip or use it any way he pleased.

The Agricultural Development Act discussion brought up the question of interest rates, and Hon. G. St. Henry and Ferguson predicted an early return to five per cent. Hon. Manning Doherty holding that hundreds of farmers are still unable to raise money under seven per cent. Mr. Ferguson demanded to know what the minister was going to do when the rate dropped, and the government side applauded the inference that Mr. Ferguson admitted the Drury government would still be in power.

"I meant what is he going to do right now," countered the Conservative leader. "The six per cent rate is statutory; it is not a matter for his board, but for the House. I should like to have the minister's opinion, to guide me, for I do not mean for a moment that he will be here."

## LOT AGAINST PUBLIC

Deliberate Attempt to Increase Price of Sugar.

Producers and Wealthy Gamblers Are Alleged to Be Manipulating to Secure a Figure of 20 Cents Per Pound — Canadians May Be Affected by the "Bullish Motive."

WASHINGTON, March 26.—When the price of sugar began to jump in this country a few weeks ago, leaving Canadian seven to ten and eleven cents a pound retail, there was an immediate undercurrent of agitation, which led to many charges and counter-charges regarding the cause, and which has now developed into a general demand for all sorts of official investigations and efforts to prevent a predicted rise in price to 20 cents a pound.

One of the questions being asked in the People's Legislative Service was the real purpose of a conference held last summer of American beet sugar interests and the Cuban producers for the purpose of limiting the Cuban crop?

It is charged that an attempt was made to limit the Cuban crop to 2,500,000 tons, while the United States requires 4,000,000 tons, the purpose being to create a shortage and greatly increase the price of American producers.

Senator Smoot (Republican, Utah), it is charged, was interested in the People's Legislative Service. He was the only Canadian representative in Cuba. When the plan failed, it is declared, Senator Smoot insisted upon and procured from Congress an increase in the duty on sugar imports.

Canadians, and especially Canadian housewives, have a direct pecuniary interest in the agitation which is being waged in the United States by the People's Legislative Service in an effort to get sugar prices brought down to normal, and to punish those whom it declares have brought about this price increase by artificial means. The pocketbook interest of Canadians is touched by the fact that the price of sugar in Canada travels up and down in close sympathy with the United States price.

When in close touch with the sugar market and industry agreed that if the speculators and manipulators in the United States succeed in driving the price up to 20 cents a pound, as they have done, they are determined to do, people here would have to bear approximately the same price increase. Asked if there was any possibility of sugar prices coming down ere the coming season opens, they refused to make a definite statement.
