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## GOVERNMENT DROPS MUCH IMPORTANT LEGISLATION

Decision is Made After Conference By Government With Leaders of Other Parties; South Norfolk Conservatives to Meet May 9.

Toronto, April 25.—The Legislature spent more time this week on the "Blue Sky" bill, to protect investors in securities, than anything else.

Under criticism by Hon. Howard Ferguson, Hartley Dewar and Col. W. H. Price, a half-dozen contentious sections were left over for redrafting or reconsideration, and many more altered. The bill will come up again when reprinted. John J. Connelley, member for North Huron, confessed that he had been fooled once or twice by "financial bootleggers" and declared that these "stiff salesmen" were now working, not only the concessions but the silence, the last reserve. The bill ought to be passed he said, if it would do any good, but he saw many loopholes in it.

### Some Measures Dropped

As a result of a conference on Tuesday by Premier Durney with the Conservative and Liberal party leaders, the Government decided to eliminate a number of important measures on the order paper. The session may therefore close in the middle of next week. The bills dropped are Commercial agreements, or combines act; Hon. Harry Mills' measure about drilling and protection of wells; Mr. Biggs' public vehicles, or "bus" bill and the Land Titles legislation. The Fish and Game amendments may also go overboard, and the fate of Charles Swayze's bill to repeal the Natural Gas Conservation Act is uncertain.

### Job Scheme Feared

Hon. Mr. Ramsey Tuesday introduced in skeleton form, a bill based on the report of the special committee which enquired into the hotels of the province. The provision for appointment of a commissioner is likely to prove

contentious, as it is claimed that it is to make a job for Edgar Watson, U. F. O. member from North Victoria, who was chairman of the committee. The bill authorizes the proposed commission to carry on and issue hotel licenses.

## ALL LONDON EXCITED

Wedding of Duke of York Will Be Gala Fete.

No Such Elaborate Preparations Have Been Made Since the Marriage of King George—There will be a Week of Festivities With Thousands of Citizens as the Guests.

LONDON, April 25.—Not since the day thirty years ago, when King George V. as the Duke of York, led his royal bride to the altar, has Great Britain prepared herself for such a gala wedding fete as will be celebrated on Thursday next, when Prince Albert, Duke of York, weds Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon in Westminster Abbey.

All plans for the great occasion are completed, and it only remains to put the finishing touches to the scenery for starting this royal pageant, for which the world, thrilled by the romance of the young prince's wooing, is a subject of his own land, has been eagerly waiting.

London herself will be decked like a bride in all the glory of her silken dais and banners, and everybody in the United Kingdom—well, almost everybody, so it seems—will be here to catch a glimpse of the winning bride and groom, and to witness the triumph of the young prince's love.

**JAPANESE PRINCE KILLED.**

Royalty in Service Motor Accident in France.

BERNAY, April 2.—Prince Narishita Kishitakawa, brother-in-law of Emperor Yoshihito, of Japan, was killed, and his wife, Princess Fusako, was injured, in an automobile accident on Sunday.

The accident occurred on the Herriers La Campagne Paris-Cherbourg road. The automobile was speeding at a high rate and had just passed another car on the road, when for some unknown cause, it suddenly swerved and dashed head-on into a tree and was completely wrecked.

Prince Kishitakawa's face had been completely crushed in, and he expired in a few minutes. The chauffeur, Victor Delat, a Frenchman, had been killed instantly. Princess Fusako was seriously injured in the head, while Prince Asaka sustained severe wounds in the face, a fractured jaw and a fractured thigh.

The prince was 36 years old. He was a major of artillery and went to Europe in 1919 for military instruction. He was a major of artillery and resided in Tokyo.

Prince Asaka is a major of infantry. He also is 36 years old. He is the eighth son of the late Prince Kuni and married Princess Nobuko, eighth daughter of Emperor Meiji.

## FORMER RECTORS HEARD AT SYNOD

Rev. Canon Spencer Resigns Position; C. E. Bourne, of Jarvis, is Appointed to Historical Committee.

Men who are former rectors of St. Paul's church were prominent at the meeting of the Niagara Synod of the Church of England in Canada held last week in Hamilton.

The resignation of Rev. Canon Spencer as clerical secretary of the Synod after 20 years service in that capacity was received with mingled expressions of regret and esteem.

Another old friend of St. Paul's, Rev. Canon Piper, formerly rector here, received hearty commendation from the Bishop and Synod in view of his good work in Thorold. Special mention was made of the fact that out of 1,400 candidates for confirmation in the diocese last year 80 were prepared by Canon Piper.

The name of a Jarvis delegate, C. E. Bourne, was added to the committee on Parish History. Mr. Bourne has a long and wide experience in the diocese which well qualifies him for the position.

Ven. Archdeacon Irving, having retired from the active duties of archdeacon, retains the title as Honorary Archdeacon.

Jarvis was represented at the Synod meetings by the rector and two lay delegates, C. E. Bourne and Arthur F. Hodgson.

Rev. R. H. Ferguson, rector of St. James church, Guelph, succeeds Rev. Canon Spencer as honorary clerical secretary of the diocese. Mr. Ferguson was for some years rector at Hagersville. He is also clerical secretary to the House of Bishops at the General Synod.

The business of the Synod was of more than ordinary importance and was conducted with unusual dispatch. Increase of clerical stipends, improvement of conditions with regard to pensions and other funds and an excellent and exhaustive charge from the Bishop were among the matters calling for the Synod's attention.
