#### JAPANESE PRINCE KILLED. Royalty in Service Motor Accident

In France.

BERNAY, April 2.—Prince Narihisa Kitashirakawa, brother-in-law of Emperor Yoshihito, of Japan, was killed, and his wife, Princess Fusako; Prince Yashuhiko Asaka, who also married a sister of the emperor and a lady-in-waiting, were seriously injured in an automobile accident on Sunday. The chauffeur of the car also was killed.
