Five Are Held for Causing Death VILLAGE COUNCIL PICKS

HACERSVILLE YOUTHS ARE ARRESTED AFTER MANY MONTHS CO BY

Preliminary . Examination . Will . Be Held in Caledonia Tuesday; Bail Is Fixed at \$5,000 Each and Has Been Fhrnished.

Five youths were arrested Tuesday morning in connection with the removal of a red light from a barrier at a bridge being constructed east of Jarvis and causing the death of Dr. John Jaques, of Fisherville, on October 29.

They are Arthur F. Smelser, Graham Forsythe, Chester Davidson and Merrill J. Evans and a youth named Webb. The charge is that they "did an act they knew or ought to have known would likely cause death and which act did cause the death of Dr. \$1; Jarvis Record Printing Company, John Jaques."

He crashed into the hurdle placed across the road at the stream where the bridge was being constructed and went over a bank 10 feet into the water. He was drowned under his car, and his young son, who was with him, had a narrow escape.

Evidence at the inquest established the fact that a red signal light had been placed on the barrier by workmen in charge of building the bridge and that it was found later several miles from the scene of the accident tied to a rail of a bridge on the Jarvis-Hamilton highway between Jarvis and Hagersville.

Representations were made last fall to the provincial government on behalf of the widow, and a resolution in favor of granting her some financial assistance was placed on the order paper of the legislature but no action was taken.

Ballot Will Call for Approval of Debenture Issue Totaling \$10,500 To Provide Equipment for Distributing Current in Village.

The property owners of Jarvis will decide on August 31 whether or not they want Hydro electric power.

The date of the special election was fixed at the regular meeting of the council Tuesday night.

Two by-laws will have to be passed before the village will get power. They will both be submitted on the same day.

The money by-law which calls for the approval of the sale of debentures amounting to \$10,500, provides that bonds extend over a period of 20 years. They will have to be paid at the rate of \$878.63 per year. That amount will not be paid from the taxes, however. The village will charge the users of the power a rate sufficient to pay all expense; and create a fund which will pay the this week at Woodlawn, the guest of
