She was riding in a buggy with Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Jones of the Scotch Line, Renton, and had been calling at the home of John Baker, on the Simcoe-Port Dover Gravel road. As they were leaving Mr. Baker's home and turning from the lane to the road the buggy was struck by an automobile supposed to be owned in Selkirk. Both hind wheels were torn off the buggy and it was upset, throwing the occupants out.

Mrs. Snyder was the most seriously injured. For a time it was thought her hip was broken but an examination by a physician showed it was only badly bruised. Mr. and Mrs. Jones were badly bruised and shaken up.

It is not expected Mrs. Snyder will be able to return home for three or four weeks.

JARVIS MAN TO MANAGE STORE

Brantford, August 30.—The shareholders of the Brant Farmers Co-Operative Society, Limited, have confirmed the report of the sale of the goodwill, stock, book accounts and other interests of the society to the Brant Feed and Seed Company, Limited, a new company organized to take care of the business. The Co-Operative Society has been running for about five years with varied earlier successes, but lately a new organization has been decided upon.

The new company will be under the joint management of A. L. Smith formerly of Jarvis, and R. J. Allen, formerly of Toronto. Mr. Smith has long been connected with the milling and grain business, and Mr. Allen has been engaged in the grain and seed business for a number of years.

Many of the shareholders in the old company have taken stock in the reorganized company. The new charter has been granted and the transfer made.

Engineer Explains Scheme Under Which Jarvis Can Get Current

STREET LIGHTS COST WILL BE MADE LESS

Taxpayers Are Safeguarded By Commission's Plan Audience Told

R. T. Rothwell, engineer of the Hydro Electric Commission of Ontario, explained the scheme under which Jarvis can obtain hydro service when he spoke in the Jarvis Music Hall Thursday evening.

Mr. Rothwell told the history of the scheme in Ontario, explaining that the commission was the result of an organization in the cities in Western Ontario formed when it was seen that manufacturing in those towns would be handicapped unless they could obtain power at a cost approximately Niagara Falls enjoyed. He told of the great growth of the scheme in the province since it was taken up as a public work and of the great increase in the number of towns taking the service.

Mr. Rothwell declared that since the scheme was started not a single municipality had to call on the taxpayers for money to carry on the scheme, that in all cases it had been self-supporting. Mr. Rothwell said the sale of power to the consumer would be controlled by the village but the rate will be fixed by the commission and will be sufficient to pay the cost of upkeep, the interest, provide a fund to retire the bonds and provide a surplus sufficient to take care of any damage to the lines or depreciation and also for extensions.

The only way Hydro will affect the taxpayer is in the cost of the street lights. The present lights are costing the village \$10 per year each. Hydro lights will cost \$4 to \$5 per year each and will light the streets in a more satisfactory manner.

In answer to a question, Mr. Rothwell declared that even in case of the plant being damaged by storm or any other agency shortly after it was put in the Ontario commission would ship repairs and would wait until a surplus was provided before collecting. He made it plain that the taxpayers would not be called on no matter what happened and that on the other hand none of the hydro funds could be diverted by the village to use for any other purpose such as building sidewalks or pavements.

PLAN SERIES OF REVIVALS HERE

Rev. Harold H. Gilbert, of Winnipeg, will commence a series of meetings in Wesley Methodist church here on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock.

The services will be continued each evening for three weeks. A song service at 7:45 o'clock will precede the regular services.

The meetings will be undenominational and the public is invited to attend. A committee is being formed from the various churches to bring the best results possible to the moral and spiritual life of the community.

Mr. Gilbert is well known through the meetings he held last November in Hagersville. During the winter he worked in Toronto in several of the larger churches. The success of the meetings is taking him again to Toronto this winter.

Mr. Gilbert is an ordained minister and the accredited evangelist of the Manitoba conference. He works under the department of evangelism and social service.

People who have heard and know Mr. Gilbert speak highly of him. To hear him once is to hear him again, they say. He desires that he be received as a messenger in the interests of the kingdom of God in its broadest sense.
