FREE STATE ELECTIONS

Prospects Are Brighter for Government Party.

Republicans Claim They Can Return More Than Half the House—Seats of Individual Ministers Are Looked Upon as Safe—Ballots to Be Counted Tuesday.

DUBLIN, Aug. 27.—On the eve of polling, uncertainty as to the result of the Irish Free State election continues but it is agreed in Government circles that within the past week the prospects of the Government party have grown brighter. This belief is due to the intensive campaign made by the Ministers who personally have addressed numerous meetings, and partly to the effect of the celebrations of the anniversary of the death of Arthur Griffiths and Michael Collins.

President Cosgrave has covered more ground and addressed more meetings during the past week than any previous leader ever did. While he is confident of retaining office, his repeated appeals for a majority outside, tends to show his unwillingness to govern by a coalition if he can help it.

The Farmers are expected to return the next strongest party, while the split in the Labor party probably will prevent much of an increase in the existing Labor representation. The Independents and Business candidates hope to return at least twenty representatives.

The seats of the individual Ministers are looked upon as safe. The Republicans, who started their campaign merely to make a demonstration, now say they can return more than half of the house of 133 members.

During the past three days the Republicans have issued a daily paper criticizing the Government's actions and checking reports in the newspapers, all of which support the Free State.

The most prominent headline in the Republican paper is a statement attributed to Archbishop Mannix, of Australia, that every enemy of Ireland is supporting the Government.

It is true that nearly all the old Unionists have announced their intention to keep President Cosgrave in office, but there still are some who will abstain from voting. They object to the oath of members of the Dail as implying an oath of loyalty to the Free State, holding this would bar them from advocating a return of British power.

It is conceded that Eamonn de Valera will be elected in County Clare and (Mrs. Cathal Brugha) Mrs. Charles Burgess, widow of the noted Sinn Feiner who died of wounds received in the July, 1922, fighting in Dublin, in Waterford. There is a keen fight in Mayo between Labor Minister McGrath and I. J. Rutledge, who is now acting as a deputy in the Dail. Mr. McGrath has been well received in the constituency, to which he is a stranger.

All the parties have been hampered by the fact that the register of voters was only issued at the last minute. Canvassing has been impossible, but the Free State has given all candidates the right to send election literature through the mails free of charge.

The Republicans have stated their case in full page advertisements in all the principal newspapers, except the Freeman's Journal, which was ignored by them as being too favorable to the Government. There has been evidently no lack of funds on the Republican side. They complain their chief election manager was arrested in Dublin and that in some places in the country their committee rooms have been raided.

The counting of the ballots does not begin until Tuesday morning and it will probably be a week before the results are all in. The Government party has put up 104 candidates; Republicans 86; Farmers 66; Labor 43. The rest bear allegiance to diverse interests, but all accept the Free State as an accomplished fact and are prepared to uphold it. Even if the Government does not obtain a clear majority, it will be able to control the Dail, as the Republicans will, as they did in the last House, absent themselves.

The electorate has been increased enormously by extension of the franchise to all persons of both sexes over twenty-one. Republicans are counting for considerable of their support on the newly enfranchised younger women, many of whom have shown great sympathy for the Republican cause. The number of registered voters is 1,790,000.

Divers Locate Wreck.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Salvage experts have at last succeeded in locating the whereabouts of the wreck of the P. & O. liner Egypt, which went down on May 21, 1922, after having been in collision with the French steamer Seine off Ushant. The wreck has been found six miles from the scene of the accident, at a depth of 84 fathoms.

The underwriters have accepted the experts' terms for an attempt to recover the gold ingots which Egypt was carrying, and which at present rates are estimated to be worth £10,000,000. Later an attempt may be made to refloat the vessel itself.

Train Is Derailed.

THAMESVILLE, Aug. 27.—The pride of the Canadian National Railway, the International Limited, was derailed 200 yards west of the local depot Saturday night at about 11.15. The tender, baggage car and four coaches left the rails. No passengers were injured.

Italian Prince Suicides.

ROME, Aug. 27.—Prince Don Bartolomeo Ruspoli, aged 40, descendant of an ancient Roman family, committed suicide Friday at his country home near Subiaco. He had been in ill-health for some time.
