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HIGH PRICES AT PURE-BRED SALE

Cattle of Better Class Much in Demand at Auction Held in Caledonia

A most successful cattle sale was held last week at Caledonia by the Hamilton District Holstein Club. Fifty head of cattle, all selected animals from accredited herds free from tuberculosis infection, were sold subject to the tuberculin test. These included a number of young bulls, fresh females, young calves and heifers. The cows sold for from \$200 to \$305 per head, and the bulls from \$100 to \$250 a head. The highest priced cow was sold by L. Moerschfelder, of Rainham Centre for \$305. J. W. Richardson, owner of the Riverside herd and president of the club, sold the highest priced bull for \$250.

All sellers and buyers expressed satisfaction with the sale and the New Arena was an ideal place to sell stock.

Some Poles Already Up—The Line to Hagersville to Be Started Next Week

The Jarvis will soon be lighted with electricity is indicated by the work being done on the streets by the Hydro Electric Commission of Ontario.

Many of the poles are already up and ready for the wire and ready for the cross arms and wire. The work of erecting the line between here and Hagersville will be started next week.

The weather the last few days has interfered greatly with the progress of erecting the lines, but the work is being pushed as rapidly as possible with a large gang of men.

There is nothing definite regarding how long the work will take, but it is expected that it will be done within a month.

The council has decided to sell the debentures to raise the money for installing electricity locally. The debentures will be sold in blocks of \$1,000 or more.

JARVIS BOY IN OLYMPIC EVENT

A. G. Smith Is Captain of Boston Hockey Team to Go to Switzerland

A former Jarvis boy will take part in the Olympic games in Switzerland in January.

He is A. G. Smith, son of R. W. Smith and brother of A. L. Smith, of Brantford, formerly of Jarvis.

Mr. Smith is captain of the Boston Amateur Athletics, the hockey team that will represent the United States in the Olympic games. At one time he was employed by E. T. Carter, but went west in the spring of 1912. He played his first game of hockey here in 1911 and in 1912 played with the caron and Moose Jaw teams and in 1914 with the 68th Overseas Battalion's team at Regina. He then went overseas, but returned in 1919 and that winter and the following winter played hockey with the Hamilton Tigers. In 1921 he was on the team of the University of Boston and in 1922 with the Boston Amateur Athletics.

He is also well known in Ontario baseball, being on the Plowites, of Hamilton, when that team won the provincial championship in 1919.

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
