THE LATE JAMES NOBLE

On Monday, February 5th, 1923, one
of the most highly respected citizens of
the Village of Jarvis, in the person of
Mr. James Noble, passed to the great beyond.
The late Mr. Noble had been confined to
the house for the past two years from
rheumatic trouble, but until about four
weeks ago his general health had been
fairly good. Then he was taken with a
mild form of the grippe, and pneumonia
later developed, which terminated with
fatal results on Monday last.

The deceased came to Jarvis with his
wife from Elgin, Scotland, in 1873, and
started in the tailoring business, which
he followed successfully until 1900, when
he was appointed postmaster of the
village, which position he held for a
number of years, retiring from the office
on account of ill health.

The late Mr. Noble held many positions
of trust in the village, being treasurer of
the Corporation for a number of years.
He was a trustee of Knox Presbyterian
Church, of which he was a valued and
faithful member.

The deceased was one of the oldest
members of King Solomon Lodge, No.
329, A. R. and A. M., Jarvis, he having
joined in 1885. In 1903 he had so ad-
vanced as to become D. D. G. M. for the
Niagara District, No. 107. No member
was more regular in attendance at lodge
meetings, and many a member will long
remember the instruction and advice
received from the late member.

The funeral (with Masonic honors) was
held on Wednesday afternoon, interment
being made in Knox Church Cemetery.
The pall bearers, all old friends and
associates of the deceased, were: Messrs.
R. W. Smith, E. T. Carter, J. H. Brown,
Dr. I. J. Leatherdale, Wm. Simpson and
Geo. L. Miller.

The Rev. W. G. Blake, of Cayuga,
conducted the services at the house.
A bereaved widow is left to face the
trials and storms of life alone and heavy
and sincere sympathy is felt for her by
her many friends.

Former Resident Passes

One of the oldest citizens of the
village of Waterford in the person
of Mrs. Mary Widdis, widow of
the late Robert Dougherty, died at
the residence of her daughter, Mrs.
Howden on Tuesday morning, Jan.
30th, after a short illness.

Mary Widdis was born in the
County of Cavan, Ireland, in the
year 1826. Coming to Canada thir-
teen years later, for some she re-
sided in Newmarket, Ont. In 1844 she
was married to Robert Dougherty.
Eight children, two boys and six
girls, were born to them. Of these,
the two sons, Robert and William,
of Hagersville, and three daughters,
Mrs. T. P. Graham, of Hagersville,
and Mrs. Howden and Mrs. Frank
Somers, of Waterford survive. Her
husband pre-deceased her thirty-six
years.

Much of her life since marriage
was spent in the Village of Jarvis,
where her sweet and gentle quali-
ties won many friends, and gave her
splendid opportunities for service in
St. Paul's Anglican Church, which
remained dear to her heart to the
last.

Since the death of her husband,
she made her home with her daugh-
ter, Mrs. Howden. They removed
from Jarvis twelve years ago, living
for eight years in Watford. There
she did her last active public work,
when in 1917, interested in the work
of the I.O.D.E., from June to Sep-
tember, she knit twenty-four pairs
of socks for the soldier boys. Since
coming to Waterford four years ago
the infirmities of old age kept her
closely at home. Those who knew her
will not soon forget her be-
nignity and sweetness, and deeply
sympathize with those who mourn
her passing.

The funeral services were held on
Thursday afternoon, a church service
was conducted by the Rev. F. G. Rich-
ardson, assisted by the Rev. E. Wilkins. The usual
burial service was held at St. Paul's
Church and Cemetery, Jarvis. Ven.
Archdeacon Irving, Rector of the
Parish, assisted by the Rev. J. H.
Ross, of Cayuga, conducted this
service. The impressive address
given by Rev. Mr. Ross, a former
rector of the parish, and the large
number present gave kindly evi-
dence of dear remembrance of a
loving mother and friend now at
rest.

THE GATES AJAR

of our best known and highly re-
spected citizens, and left in his wake
a wide spread path of loneliness and

has to tear itself from the virtues of
holiness and depart into the fiery
furnace, for the Lord saith, "Get ye
hence" and Satan has to obey.

Since the days of Adam and Eve,
the first-born parents, who clothed
themselves in the mantle of sin,
and in order to shake of this mantle
we have to pass through this tor-
menting element we call death, but
which is nothing more than the
transformation of our souls from
this life to the Heavenly realm,
where we will "shine as lights be-
fore men."—Matt. 5: 16.

In Him our weary souls have rest,
Though we were weak and vile;
We'll read our names upon His
And see our Father's smile. (Breast)

In death our bondage to Satan is
over, the oppressor's yoke is broken
and the followers of our blessed
Lord are given their promised re-
ward.

In this instance it is our painful
duty to chronicle the passing away
of Mr. Richard Roberts, who, after
a week's illness of pneumonia, fell
into the sleep that knows no earth-
ly waking at 9:25 on Friday even-
ing, February 2nd, 1923, despite
the best efforts that medical skill
and loving hands could do. His en-
tire family were by his side at the
end.

Mr. Roberts first saw the light of
day on March 13, 1848, near Whit-
by, Ont., and was the eldest son of

the late Mr. and Mrs. Roberts,
who came to Jarvis in the
pioneer days. On January 29th,
1870, he was united in marriage to
Miss Emma Gray, daughter
of the late Mr. and Mrs. Richard
Walters, of Jarvis. By this
union nine children were born.
They were: Mary, the eldest, born
G. of Jarvis; Nora, born
W., of Toronto; Herbert
W., of Toronto; Arthur
of Niagara Falls; Annie, of Ni-
agara Falls; Arthur
Belbec (and Paul), of Jarvis; Ben-
jamin (Johnston), of Jarvis.

For the first time in his life
after his marriage he resided in
Walpole in 1897, where he remained
on a farm down on the road,
where he remained for some years
ago, when he moved into Jarvis,
where he resided until the time of his
demise. His wife died of cancer on
December 17th, 1917.

The deceased was a strong sup-
porter of the Methodist Church and
a Liberal in politics. He was a very
well known and highly respected by
a great legion of friends.

The funeral was held on Monday
afternoon at the Methodist Church
here and was largely attended. The
pall-bearers were: George
Histed, John J. P. Jones and John
Wadham, and the three remaining
brothers of the deceased, Aaron
Roberts, of Toronto; Robert
of London; and Albert Roberts, of
St. Thomas.

The Rev. Geo. Richardson con-
ducted the services and referred to
the deceased as a "true and Christian
life, extolling his many virtues and
loving help towards the im-
provement of others. His words from
Psalm 136: "His mercy endureth
for ever." "The Lord is my strength,
I shall not want." "Who shall say
when they are with the All-
Powerful God?"

Goodness and mercy shall follow
me all the days of my life.
I shall surely see the goodness of
the Lord in the land of the living.
His word shall be as a lamp unto
my feet.

on Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 8th,
at 2 o'clock. The Rev. F. G. Rich-
ardson will officiate.
