NEWS TOPICS OF WEEK

Important Events Which Have Occurred During the Week

The Busy World's Happenings Carefully Compiled and Put Into Handy and Attractive Shape for Perusal by the Readers of Our Paper.

TUESDAY.

Scottish curlers beaten at Galt. Moonshine whiskey kills eight men. North Essex by-election fixed for March 1. Thirty Germans killed in clash in Ruhr town. Strikers in Paris bring three francs each. U. S. Ambassador Harvey arrives again in London. Ontario farmers are selling little grain this winter. France and Italy oppose ultimatum to Turks by Allies. Norfolk Co-operative Association reports good season. Plan is suggested to decide world's golf champion annually. Hamilton Tigers defeat Granites 5 to 1 in O. H. A. senior game. Mayor Hughes of Welland declared unseated on application of taxpayers. Martial law prevails in Ruhr, which is now completely isolated by strikes. Wolves and a wilder are seen on northern shore of Lake Erie, near Port Stanley. "High-graders" are sentenced to three years for robberies from Kirkland Lake mine. Ex-Mayor and former Controller of Ottawa apply for unseating of Mayor and Board of Control. Albert Blizzard, well-known horse breeder, dies at Toronto as result of injuries from a kick by a horse. Premier Oliver of British Columbia, speaking at Hamilton, says that Canadians are becoming afraid of hard work. Canada's chance of securing repayment of loan of \$50,000,000 made to Greece is not good in the immediate future is the opinion of M. Kormasintios, a merchant from Piraeus, who is visiting Toronto.

WEDNESDAY.

People of France resolutely behind Ruhr occupation. Turks are angry at terms of peace pact submitted by Allies. Social Service Congress in Ottawa hears conditions in prisons. Bonaparte are in progress at St. Thomas, Peterboro and Barrie. Fairs and exhibitions convention to ask Government for larger grants. Argonauts win O.H.A. senior game from University of Toronto, 5 to 4. St. Hyacinthe, Que., woman throws potash in rival's face at church door. A woman in Paris kills husband and self three days after marriage. Rebels in Ireland are apting the torch to homes of Senator of Free State. Threat to burn Fort William orphanage, signed K.K.K., is causing alarm. Presbyterian Church at close of financial year reports receipts as satisfactory. Saskatchewan Grain Growers decide that they will remain in provincial politics. Scottish curlers win afternoon and evening games from Western Ontario rink at London. Hamilton woman dies after refusing to let doctor take piece of Christian Science. Two hotelkeepers at Collinswood are charged with attempt to burn premises to secure insurance. St. Mary's man throws wife and child from window to escape flames when home is destroyed. Harry Greb retains his American light-heavyweight title by defeating Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia. Pure-bred Holstein cow raised in York township makes new world record for milk and butter production. Mayor of London will call special meeting of council to ask resignation of entire personnel of City Fire Brigade. The Toronto Board of Education celebrated the 75th anniversary of its inauguration with the City Council guests at a banquet. The local Agricultural Societies of Ontario report extremely profitable conditions for 1922 at the annual convention of the Ontario Association of Fairs and Exhibitions.

THURSDAY.

French grip tightens in Ruhr district. Explosion entombs 800 German miners. Two men were hurt at Apsley by a falling tree. Allied concord at Lausanne Conference is restored. United States Railway Board restores eight-hour day. "One-man-one-vote" bill defeated in Legislature, 33 to 23. Premier Drury appeals for efforts to check rural depopulation. Heavy toll taken by influenza pneumonia during past month. Stratford rink wins Just Wright Trophy at St. Thomas bonspiel. Agria Lee seniors win O.H.A. fixture from Parkdale C. C., 2 to 2. Customs and excise revenue, for January show substantial increase. Ontario asks Dominion Government for subsidy for railway to James Bay. Women are chief agents in smuggling drugs, say police at border points. Number of unemployed in Ontario is 10,041, according to Provincial Minister of Labor. It is expected that Toronto will appeal against the award of \$11,188,500 for Toronto Street Railway. British Columbia growers will use five-year contract to control marketing of fruit in their province. David Reid, aged 70 years, dies at Toronto from effect of burns received while lighting his pipe. Jole Ray of Illinois A. C., Chicago, lowers his own indoor record for mile and a half at Madison Square Garden. Attorney-General gives McLarty, who was refused bail by Stratford magistrate, his liberty on \$5,000 bail. Move will be made to bring the Montreal priest, Abbe Delorme, to

Montreal. Russian refusal to Lausanne. Allies send ultimatum regarding Mosul. Irish Free State union with Ulster. French Chamber gives vote of confidence. Jersey cows gain popularity in Province of Quebec. German judges to work in Cologne Directorate. Ontario Horticultural Association hold annual meeting. Harriet Bennett holds up Canadian National train just outside Regina. A Hamilton woman collapses and dies when told of death of husband. Hugh M. Ferguson, well-known Toronto lawyer, dies after brief illness. Osogodo Hall eliminated when they lose to U. of Toronto intermediates, 2 to 1. Trapper in Northern Ontario wins in desperate fight with pack of wolves. Travers Allan of Brockville is the tourist found dead in Valley of Kings in Egypt. Sir George Foster pleads for support for League of Nations before Social Service Congress. Ottawa judge tells civil servants who delay paying income taxes he will send them to jail. Harry Kaskey of Chicago wins Saranac Lake skating meet; Chas. Gorman, St. John, is second. Premier King defends attitude of Government in regard to Britain's note on Near East crisis. Robert Ferguson is reinstated as chief clerk in Customs Department, Toronto, after temporary suspension. Trades and Labor Council expresses disapproval of medical societies seeking legislation for "absolute control of the healing art." One man has been arrested and another sought by police on charge of stealing carload of clothing sent north for relief of fire sufferers.

FRIDAY.

Russian Soviet police arrest anti-Red band. Northern Ontario curlers defeat visiting Scots. Rebels still raising historic mansions in Ireland. French position in Ruhr becomes appreciably stronger. Turks take issue with Allies on points in peace treaty. German railway men in Rhine region returning to work. French Commission on Finances seeking to balance budget. Irish rebels propose united front in Free State to war on Ulster. President Harding sends debt funding proposals to Congress. Harry Kaskey of Chicago wins two races at Montreal skating meet. Case of German minorities in Poland goes to The Hague Tribunal. Soldiers' Settlement Board reports past year was good one for scheme. Miners in Drumheller, Alta., strike, but return to work within six hours. James L. Hughes champions cause of bilingual teaching in public schools. Henry H. Mason elected president of St. George's Society, Toronto, at its annual meeting. Bill for \$5,000,000 loan for Vancouver harbor improvements will be sponsored by Government. University of Toronto seniors beaten by McGill in intercollegiate hockey fixture at Montreal, 5 to 3. Mayor of London offers reward for incendiary who attempted to burn St. Matthew's Anglican Church. Joseph T. Shaw, Progressive member for West Calgary, decides to quit party and act as Independent. Henry Setner, Toronto, following a quarrel with his wife, drew a revolver from a drawer and killed himself. Kitchener seniors beat Granites 1 to 0, and Hamilton win from Parkdale, 10 to 3, in O.H.A. senior games. Toronto's contributions to Ontario Government in amusement taxes in past three years amount to \$1,800,000.

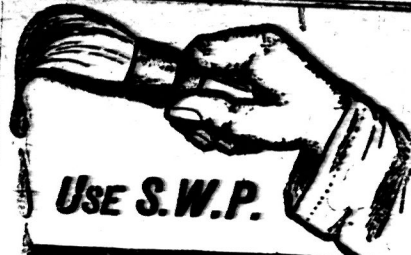
MONDAY.

Gen. Kuroki dies at the age of 78 in Tokio. Cabinet decision on funding debt pleases London. Stocking at Toronto, \$4.73 3/4; at New York, \$4.88 3/4. Lausanne Conference fails, Turks refusing to sign treaty. Irish convention in Dublin to bring about peace in the South. St. Patrick's and Canadiens win quarter-final hockey games. Scotland defeated Wales in international rugby games, 11 to 8. Four new world skating records were made at Johnson City meet. Situation in Ruhr district settles down to routine military occupation. Canadian open golf championship is awarded to Lakeview Golf Club of Toronto. London's Hydro system absorbs increased costs of power and shows surplus of earnings. Electors of Quebec vote to-day after a campaign marked by vigorous oratory on both sides. Canadian National Railways will reorganize Canada's Government-owned merchant marine. A despatch from Washington predicts passage of debt refunding measure, but not without a fight. Nipissing's needs for more Hydro-power will be impressed on Premier Drury by delegation to Toronto. Proposal being considered to establish a Provincial Department of Child Welfare, with Rev. Peter Bryce as Deputy Minister. Medical men on Toronto Board of Education scout idea of cushioned seats in schools as advocated by Dr. F. P. Millard in reported statement in Montreal. Principal Alfred Gandler of Knox College is to be nominated Moderator of General Assembly of Presbyterian Church by Presbytery of Halifax at Port Arthur in June.
