Caledonia Editor Passes Oldest Continuous Publisher in Haldimand County Died on Friday of Last Week

49 Years With 'The Sageman' Dean of Country Journalism Was Well and Favourably Known Throughout the Province - 40 Years an Editor - A Capable and Conscientious Leader of Men

It is with deep regret that we this week have to record the passing of Mr. Henry Bonastow Sawle, editor and publisher of 'The Caledonia Sageman' in the 49th year of his age, who died on Friday, February 15th, 1923.

The late Mr. Sawle will be greatly missed by his brother editors and publishers in this part of the province. 'The Record' extends sincerest sympathy to the relatives thus bereaved and to the community that loses a faithful friend.

The following extract is from this week's 'Sageman': - 'Mr. Henry Bonastow Sawle, the publisher and proprietor of this paper, passed peacefully away on Friday morning last. Although he had not been in good health for a few months, the end came suddenly, as he was up and around the day before.

'Deceased was born in Iffracombe, England, and came to Caledonia about fifty years ago, a boy of fourteen, and entered this office when the paper was owned by his brother, Mr. W. T. Sawle. He became proprietor of 'The Sageman' forty years ago, and had been prominent in the community ever since. In that time he had seen every other business in the village change hands.

'When a young man he was Reeve of this village for several years, and was Reeve again during the years 1918, 1919 and 1920, and also a member of the County Council. He had also been a member of the Board of Education for several years. At the time of his death and for many previous years he was the Secretary of the Caledonia Agricultural Society and took a great interest and a pride therein.

'He was always a public spirited citizen and took a great interest in the welfare of the place in which he had lived for so many years, and which he loved so much. 'Always greatly interested in athletic sports, and in his younger days an enthusiastic lacrosse player, he gathered about him on his own lawn the nucleus of the Caledonia Bowling Club. 'He married Miss Jennie Ryan forty years ago and she died in the year 1917, and in the year 1920 he married Miss Mary Florence Gair, of Toronto, who survives him. He leaves three daughters by his first marriage - Mrs. (Dr.) L. A. Truman, of Hamilton; Mrs. Harrison Arrell, of Caledonia; and Mrs. Roy Ames, of Panola, Alta. His only son, Kenner, was killed in France, in 1916, serving with the Seaforth Highlanders. 'In politics he was a strong Conservative, and in religion was a member of the Anglican Church.

'The funeral, which was held on Sunday last at the Caledonia Cemetery, was very largely attended.
