Orthodox Russians in Poland from those in Russia. He was an appointee of Patriarch Tikhon, now in a Moscow jail, and was supposedly dependent on the Moscow Patriarchate. But once appointed, the Metropolitan opposed Tikhon's views and signed a concordat with the Polish Government which Tikhon considered meant the death of the Orthodox Church in Poland, as it gave the State power to destroy the authority of the priests.

In the Archbishopric of Chelm, where there were flourishing Orthodox communities, the Poles, under their concordat with George, had closed most of the churches.

It was then that Smaragh went to Moscow and saw Tikhon before the Patriarch was removed by the Bolshevists. Tikhon blessed Smaragd and sent him back with the title of Archbishop of Chelm, an office that George had held in addition to that of Metropolitan.

Both George and the Polish Government refused to recognize the patriarch's right to appoint the archbishop. But last Friday night Smaragd, known as a fanatic and a giant in stature, called on the Metropolitan to obtain recognition of his right to the Archbishopric. George refused and Smaragd, in a fit of rage,

Now all Orthodox sentiment in Poland is on the side of the archbishop and opposed to the murdered George. Orthodox churchmen throughout the country are agitating for the appointment of the Metropolitan murdered as protector of the faith. 
