OUR 45TH BIRTHDAY

Just 44 years ago (in 1878) the late Frank N. Pettit established "The Jarvis Record" and issued the first number of the paper. At that time the prospects were not very bright, and the "knowing ones" predicted that the newcomer would not last three months. However, the critics in this case were wrong and "The Record" has during the forty-four years of its existence, published at different intervals the obituaries of the prophets and is still here trying to cater to the wants of a reading public.

The late Mr. Pettit continued as editor and publisher of "The Record" until the Summer of 1887, when he disposed of his interests to Messrs. Fred W. Elliott and J. W. Rodgers, who assumed control under the firm name of Elliott and Rodgers. In a short time Mr. Rodgers purchased his partner's interests and continued as editor and proprietor until the time of his death on November 5th, 1901.

On the death of her husband Mrs. Elva Rodgers took charge of "The Record" and for over nineteen years was successful in keeping the standard of "The Record" up to that established by her predecessors.

On January 1st, 1920, Mrs. Rodgers sold the office and property to "The Jarvis Record Printing Company," a large number of stockholders, most of whom are the leading men of the village, and who have been successful in improving the reputation of "The Record" as one of the best papers in this part of the county.

Heroism Rewarded

We clip the following from Saskatoon exchange of recent issue: "Probably the only private individual in Canada to be awarded a Gold War trophy by the Federal Government for safekeeping, Sergeant S. H. M. and Belgian Croix de Guerre lives at 1104 19th Street and received a captured German machine gun from Ottawa.

"The letter notifying states that hitherto given only to soldiers, but in circumstances his appointment made in the

Cross made on his behalf by the then commanding officer of the 72nd Highlanders, Brigadier-General J. A. Clark, M. P. at Paschenchdale, for conspicuous gallantry during the operations against the enemy east of Paschenchdale from Oct. 30 to Nov. 2, 1917. Firing with a Lewis gun from the shoulder Sgt. Irwin killed or wounded every member of three enemy machine gun crews, which had prepared to open an enfilading fire on 'A' company of the battalion located on the west slope of the Crest Farm. After disposing of 20 of the enemy, Sgt. Irwin captured the three German machine guns single handed. Later in the engagement he personally took 6 prisoners, according to the recommendation for decoration.

Sgt. Irwin was born in Walpole Township and is a nephew of Mr. George A. Irwin, of Jarvis. The "Record" desires to add its congratulations to our former citizen, on the recognition of his services to the British Empire during the course of the late war, and hopes that the recommendation for the much coveted V. C. will be favourably considered by the imperial authorities.
