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## TRIBUTE IS PAID HEROES OF WAR IN SERVICE HERE

Hundreds Gather for Church Parade and Memorial Service Followed by Sacred Concert by Regimental Band of Norfolk Rifles.

Jarvis, almost to a man and a woman too, turned out Sunday to honor the men who fell in the Great War. At the special memorial service held in Knox Presbyterian church in the afternoon and again at the sacred concert in the evening, given by the band of the First Norfolk Rifles in the Arena park, the whole village turned out, as well as many from the surrounding district and from distant points.

The church was filled for the service in the afternoon and many could not find room to get in while many others remained outside, knowing they could not find a place in the church. In the evening the Women's Institute provided lunch for the visiting veterans and their families and did the work so well and in such abundance that no person went away hungry and there was plenty left to feed them a second time.

William Parkinson, who had charge of raising the funds for the event, also made a success of his part in the affair. He obtained all that was required and could have obtained more had it been needed.

The following committee had charge of the arrangements: Dr. J. L. Leatherdale, chairman, J. Robinson, secretary, William Parkinson, treasurer, Murray Biggar, William Laidlaw, Thomas Phipps, Seth Laidlaw, Thomas Reynolds and Rev. W. T. Brown.

The veterans assembled at the Arena park at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, and, headed by a detachment from the First Norfolk Rifles, the regimental band and a color party, under Col. Winters, and marched to the church. After the service they returned to the Arena for lunch. The band concert was held in the evening when several selections were rendered and much appreciated by the crowd which had gathered.

During the concert, the reveille of the village, George L. Miller, on behalf

of the citizens, expressed the satisfaction of the town at the splendid showing made by the veterans at the parade. He also thanked Col. Winters for the way in which he had helped the veterans, the officers and the men of the First Norfolk Rifles for their attendance, and the band for the music, both in the afternoon and evening, and concluded by hoping that in the near future the people of Jarvis might have the pleasure of again welcoming them to the village.

Among the veterans in the parade W. H. Fradley has perhaps seen more service than any of the others. He enlisted in the Fourth Royal Irish Dragoon Guards, October 1895 and served in India from 1897 to 1905 and in Africa from 1905 to 1908, leaving the regiment while stationed at Brighton, England, in 1909, having served 14 years with it, 11 years having been spent abroad. He again enlisted on the outbreak of the war with Germany on August 10, 1914, in the Army Service Corps. He was Sergeant drill instructor at Aldershot until March 20, 1915, when he proceeded to Egypt with headquarters staff, Egyptian Expeditionary Force. He served in Egypt and Palestine for three years and nine months without leave a day, and returned to England in October of 1918. He was discharged February of 1919 with a total of 18½ years service, 14½ years of which was spent abroad.

Rev. W. T. Brown, pastor of Knox Presbyterian church, in preaching to the veterans, took as his text, "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friend," and said:

"When I was approached some time ago by the veterans to deliver a memorial sermon for the men who fell overseas, I thought this Sunday, the Sunday of our great national holiday, would be an appropriate one on which to hold that service. Today we celebrate Dominion Day, the day on which this Canada of ours became a dominion, and the thoughts of most of our people dwell on the great men who were responsible for Confederation, Sir John A. Macdonald, Cartier, Tupper, Galt and Brown. We will think of them as the master-builders of our great land, and in so doing we will be giving them their proper title. It is well that their memory should be kept green, but let us never forget that there are others who have been builders with them, that they alone did not make this nation of ours great. The men who really made this nation great were the men of the rank and file, whose names never are written on the pages of history and yet without whom this nation of ours would not be possible. And amongst the rank and file, there are now who bear a more honored name than those who gave their lives for the cause of freedom in the last war, and it is right and proper that at this season when we contemplate the greatness of our Dominion and remember those who made it great, that we should honor them; and so the object of our gathering here this afternoon to pay our meed of tribute to the men of the Canadian Corps, and more especially those from the village of Jarvis and vicinity who made the supreme sacrifice."

## Women Meet

Varency Women's Institute held its annual summer meeting at the home of Mrs. A. A. Mulkins on June 19.

More than 70 members and visitors from Nanticoke, Sandusk and Varency enjoyed a varied program offered by local talent and Mrs. Wollard of the department. Mrs. K. K. Saunders, Varency president, occupied the chair and introduced each number in her usual happy manner. A duet by Mrs. Maunsell and Miss Oakes, of Nanticoke, was much appreciated as was also recitations by Miss Doris Lonson and little Helen Lonson, Mrs. J. K. Pond, of Sandusk, and Mrs. R. Marx, of Nanticoke, delivered short addresses both dealing with community work in connection with the boys and girls. They emphasized the fact that amusement, both varied and entertaining, must be furnished in the homes and that too much pressure must not be brought to bear by the parents on the young people in selecting their life work.

The district secretary gave a short report of the Women's Institute work in the county. Twenty-two branches, with a membership of 732 showed total receipts of more than \$4,500. Of that amount \$1,200 was spent in local improvements and more than \$700 was sent to provincial hospitals and charities, not including the great amount of clothing and household articles sent to Northern Ontario, Selkirk alone sending 14 bales.

Three community halls are under way and two pianos have been purchased. Caledonia planted a hedge around their cemetery. Cayuga placed drinking fountains in their schools. Fisherville furnished cocoa and hot lunches for three schools. Hagersville placed first aid boxes in the school. Nelles Corners, with a membership of 20, paid \$566.21 on their community hall. Clanbrassil, with 14 members, held a university extension course and is undertaking a hall.

Mrs. Wollard gave a varied and interesting address on "Health, Fancy Stitches and Embroideries" and an interesting peep behind the scenes on federation work.

After singing the National Anthem, Varency branch furnished lunch to the gathering. Much gratitude is due Mr. and Mrs. Mulkins for making the meeting such a decided success.
