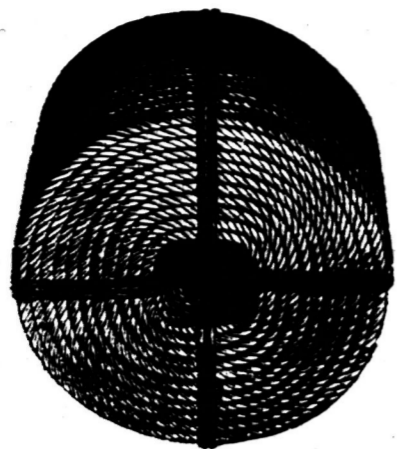

The Duty of Fire Prevention

It is impossible to say how many fires along railway lines are not due to engine sparks, but to the thoughtless smoker tossing away his cigarette or cigar butt. However, there is no doubt a fair number of forest fires originate in this way, and such are preventable. Each individual should realize his personal responsibility to be careful with fire in any form in northern Ontario.

WILL SELECT LEADER.

U. F. O. Will Find Successor to Ex-Premier Drury.

TORONTO, July 2.—The U. F. O. party during the latter part of the coming week is to endeavor to restore itself from the state of wreckage into which the general election results have cast it and to become again an effective political organization. A meeting of the Farmer candidates in last Monday's contest, both elected and defeated, has been called for Thursday, and at it questions vital to the future of the Farmers' political movement are to be discussed.

Of prime importance at the conference will be the question of a leader to succeed Hon. Mr. Drury. In this connection the names of Hon. F. C. Biggs and Hon. Manning Doherty, two of the U. F. O. Ministers who survived the landslide, are prominently mentioned. Both have ability as Parliamentarians to recommend them for the duty of House leader, and both have the additional qualification of a practical knowledge of farming. Hon. Mr. Doherty, however, as the incumbent of the Agricultural portfolio during the past four years, is believed by many in the U. F. O. ranks to have come closest to the voters on the back-concession lines, and he at present seems to be the favorite for the position of leader. Hon. Mr. Raney, who was Premier Drury's lieutenant in the past House, is also a possibility for leadership, but it is understood that the sentiment in the party ranks is in favor of having a leader who has bona fide qualifications as an agriculturist.

A further question which Thursday's meeting will have to consider, and it is one which must of necessity be answered in the affirmative, is whether or not the U. F. O. is to have a future in Ontario politics, or whether it is to become merely an adjunct of the Liberal party. Opinion on this question is by no means unanimous amongst the farmers. Involved in it is the old controversy between broadening out and class politics, and those of the farmers who favor the former policy are outspoken in stating their belief that class rule can never again gain the ascendancy in the province. Premier Drury, it is well known, takes his broadening-out views with him into his retirement, and sees a future for Progressivism, as he calls the U. F. O. movement, merely as a substitute for the Liberalism which was a provincial issue in the Liberal party's prime.

Had Narrow Escape.

MILTON, July 2.—Miss Ruby Cordingly of the 19th line, Trafalgar township, east of Milton, while returning home from school during the tornado which passed through this part of Ontario last week, was struck by a fence rail and knocked unconscious. When she recovered consciousness she was lying on the road beside a cow which had been killed by falling trees.
