Co-Operative Shipping Of Wool

Due to the success of the co-operative marketing of wool from this county during past years, arrangements have been completed for shipping this season's clip. The places and dates of loading are as follows:

Dunnville—G. T. R., June 14th.
Cayuga—G. T. R., June 15th, a.m.
Jarvis—G. T. R., June 15th, p.m.
Ragunville—G. T. R., June 16th, a.m.
Caledonia—G. T. R., June 16th, p.m.

This wool will be shipped to the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, who, under date of May 25th, make the following quotations:—Medium Combing, 35cts; Low Combing, 27cts to 28cts; and Course, 23cts to 24cts. These prices are for unwashed wool. An advance of 10cts to 15cts per pound is made immediately after grading.

Sacks and twine will be supplied at the car, or may be obtained by writing to the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga.

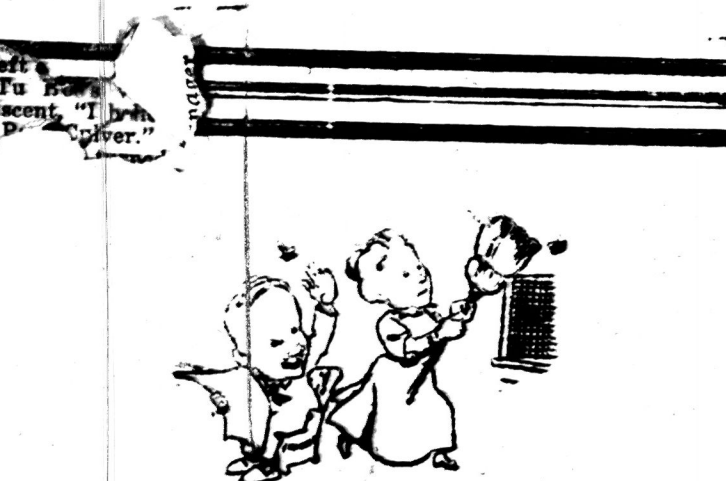
