## Co-Operation

It is a dangerous feeling when one class believes it is more important or above another class.

For contentment in any community, in any province or in any nation it is imperative that all the classes in that community, province or nation are sympathetic towards the trials, and disappointments and ideals of all the other classes. The "I am better than thou" spirit has no place where contentment and happiness are among the aims of the people.

And that applies to social and business life, yes even to political life. In the cities the farmer is often looked upon as a person who does not amount to much. In the country a farmer is often heard to say that all things spring from the land. And persons who have those views are not working to the best advantage of either themselves or their neighbors. The city dweller must remember that he had to depend on the farmer for his food and for his clothing. The dweller on the farm must remember that the doctor from the city was called when he was sick, that the undertaker from the city will be called when he dies, that he goes to the city for the implements with which to till his land and for many implements with which to reap his crop. He goes to the city to find his market.

No one class can do without the other. It is a mistaken idea that one is above the other, that one is more dependent than the other. It is such a belief that causes revolution. It is such a belief that sows the seed of discontent and brings only a harvest of unhappiness.

Co-Operation of all the classes, a broad sympathetic ideal is all that will be tolerated in any community, in any province or in Canada.

## Ontario First

Monday is election day—the day when the people of the province of Ontario will choose the men that will administer the affairs of the banner province of Canada for the next four years.

Now is the time, if ever there was a time when a wise choice of those men is of paramount importance. It is necessary that loyalty to their province should arise in the midst of the voters above loyalty to party affiliations, no matter whether those affiliations extend back through the years of the activities of the older parties or are of more recent welding with the U. F. O.

It is not the policy or the intention of the Record to pick out any one man and say he should be elected. Each party is represented in Haldimand county. The electors have all had an opportunity of hearing the three sides of the public questions as they affect Ontario. The most of them have as it was their duty to do. It is the man who made up his mind to vote according to his party affiliations, attended the meetings of that party alone, read the press favorable to that party alone and shut his ears to all other things that will not be able to vote intelligently or in the best interests of his province Monday.

Since the days of the war there has been a feeling of unrest, politically as well as socially. That unrest all over the world has been the cause of the downfall of governments. There is not a single war cabinet which directed things during the war, in power today. The governments of Canada and Ontario are included. The chance has been in effect long enough for the people to judge its wisdom. If the change in Ontario was wise the U. F. O. government should be returned. The older parties might not be. That is for the people to judge. The war has now been ended. The long for the argument that there are not normal to be an argu-

ment. Governments have had an opportunity to make them normal and that is their whole duty. Of course the war has to be paid for still. That means that the government is like an industrial concern which finds its overhead cost increased. The only way to offset the increase is to increase the business. It is the duty of governments to increase the prosperity of the province or nation to such an extent that the cost of the war will not be felt and that has been their duty since the end of the war. It is for the voters to decide Monday whether or not that has been accomplished in Ontario. If they decide that it is their duty to decide which, if either of the old parties, can do better. That should not be difficult. They have the records of the three parties. They know what they have done in the past and by that they will know what they are able to decide in the future.

Two factors will enter into the decision Monday. One is the efficiency of the whole party in the province and the other is the efficiency of the individual man seeking election in the county. Both are important and it is difficult to say which is the most important. A strong opposition is as important as a wise government. The voters have three men. One of them has been tried in provincial affairs. The others have been tried in county and village affairs. Their records for the management of public affairs is an open book. It is imperative that the best of those three men be sent to Toronto.

A lot of false issues have been raised as is done in every election campaign. Dust tends to hide the real issues, both the good and the bad of a retiring government. The chaff in the election propaganda must be thrown aside and the voter must penetrate to the real issues. They must decide if the late government had been extravagant and incompetent. They must compare it with the gone before. Only then can they find the right answer, and when they have found it, it is their duty to cast aside party loyalty and party affiliations and vote for that which will mean the retention of Ontario in her place as the banner province of Canada, for that which will give the citizens a spirit of security and faith in the government, which will mean contentment and happiness.

The government of the province of Ontario is entitled to the best man Haldimand can send. Of course a member from Haldimand on the government side can do more for the county than a member with the opposition. In their own interests the electors should consider that if they have a feeling that they know which party will form the next government. But that should not be the whole or even the most important factor. Rather, it should be the deciding factor, all other things being equal.

The voters have a grave duty to perform Monday. Let their watchword be "The province first, party forgotten."

We hope the best man wins.

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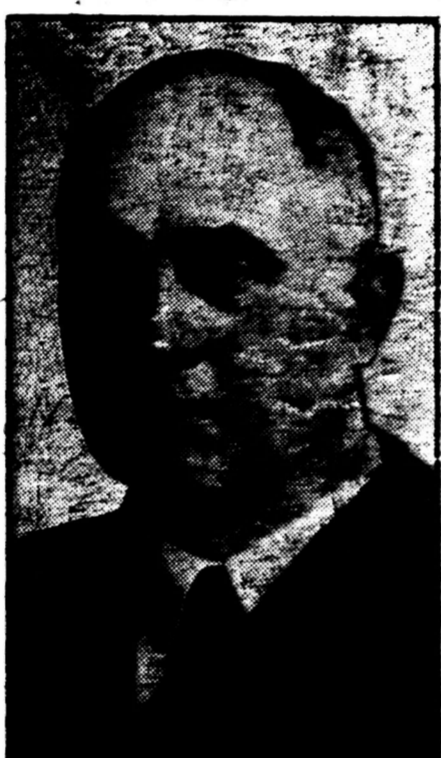
