MR. E. M. HARRIS FOR JUDGE

"We are pleased to announce the candidacy of our fellow townsman, Evander M. Harris, for the office of Judge of the thirty-fourth judicial circuit, consisting of the counties of Ogemaw, Osage, Crawford, Roscommon, Arenac and Gladwin, at the primaries to be held March 7th. Nominating petitions have already been circulated by his many friends in the several counties.

"Mr. Harris came to Ogemaw county in August 1887, and during the early days was a teacher in the rural schools of the county. He studied law in the office of Judge Sharpe, and was admitted to the bar in 1892.

"During the past 30 years he has been engaged in the active practice of law throughout the several counties of this circuit, and has made many friends. For twelve years he occupied the position of prosecuting attorney of Ogemaw county, performing the duties of that office faithfully and fearlessly. During the past four years he has been selected as chairman of the Republican county committee. He was made first president of West Branch Chamber of Commerce, and through his efforts this body received an impetus for good that has continued to be felt to the present time. In fact, Mr. Harris has always identified himself with good, progressive movements

which have stood for the betterment of the county, state and nation. He is one of the most prominent attorneys of Northern Michigan. He is a good orator, possesses a keen legal mind, and has won a personal reputation for his honesty, fearlessness and impartiality. We honestly believe, that if Mr. Harris is honored with this high office, that the citizens of the thirty-fourth judicial circuit will be highly pleased with his administration of justice from the bench."

The foregoing, taken from the West Branch press of West Branch, Ogemaw county, Mich., shows how high Mr. Harris stands in the estimation of his fellow citizens. He was born in Nanticoke where a sister, Mrs. John Campbell, and a brother, William Harris, still live. Leaving there at the age of 19, he went to Northern Michigan where he secured a position as school teacher at a time when the little, red country school-houses were reached by paths through the woods.

While teaching he studied law and when admitted to the bar entered into a partnership with James Ross, also a Nanticoke "Old Boy". They hung out their shingle in West Branch. So well did Mr. Harris succeed in his chosen profession that he was elected prosecuting attorney for the county, a position he held until he was made circuit court commissioner, a position he holds at present.

Mr. Harris visits his old home and friends in Nanticoke and vicinity every summer he has spent from his duties and has hosts of friends there who wish him every success in his present campaign.

County Council Meets
