Poet-Author Passes In Ottawa. OTTAWA, Feb. 26.—John Edgar Reginald Gourlay, author and journalist, a noted contributor of prose and poems to the leading magazines Canada, England and the United States, died at a local hospital here Sunday, after a short illness, in his rd year. About a year ago he came here from Picton, where he practiced law after being called to the Bar in 1881. About fifteen years ago he gave up law to devote all of his time to literature, in which field he has won marked success. In 1908 he produced "The Tower of Fire" and also "The Necklace of Padura." He was busied on a book about Mexico when he was taken ill with heart trouble. He was born in Hamilton, the eldest son of the late Lt.-Col. William Gourlay, and was educated at Hellmuth College, London, and Trinity College, Toronfo, from which he was graduated in 1875 with the gold medal for the prize poem. He married Alice Lyle Strong, eldest daughter of the late Sir Henry Strong, Chief Justice of Canada, who sur-
