The doctors who performed the autopsy found traces of fusel oil in Marr's stomach, and in their report explained that death had evidently been caused by drinking improperly cured whiskey. Belore appeared in the County Police Court a few day's after Marr's death and paid a \$15 fine and costs on conviction of being .\$21277 20 intoxicated in a public place, and about ten days ago he pleaded guilty to the charge of having liquor unlawfully in his possession, paying a \$200 fine and qosts.
