WORKING FOR REUNION

David Lloyd George Speaks to British Liberals.

Sir John Simon Grows Sarcastic and Hints at Opportunism in His Reply to Former Coalition Premier—Hon. H. H. Asquith Will Speak on Proposal During Coming Week.

LONDON, March 5.—Replying to Lloyd George's appeal uttered in Edinburgh last week for a reunion of the Liberal forces, Sir John Simon, one of the leaders of the Independent Liberal party, in a speech at Clockheaton, said Lloyd George, in dealing with the qualifications for political life, omitted the only one that really commanded public confidence, "the quality of speaking what you really believe, and of not changing your political destination with every wind that blows."

Continuing, he said that united action was really the preliminary to formal unity, and he complained of the attitude of the National Liberals in the House of Commons on several recent occasions. Fighting Liberals, said Simon, would welcome with all their hearts every newcomer who would fight alongside them for the Liberal cause, but he believed Liberalism would become impotent if it took over the liabilities of the past four years which drove the last coalition into political bankruptcy.

The reply of H. H. Asquith, leader of the Independent Liberals, to Lloyd George's new movement for a reunion of the two Liberal forces will probably be forthcoming when he speaks at Cambridge on Wednesday.

The London Chronicle, Lloyd George's mouthpiece, expresses the hope that Mr. Asquith will be as plain and outspoken as was Lloyd George last week. He will not likely disagree with what Lloyd George said as to the need for reweaving a united Liberal party, says the Chronicle, and adds: "Unless the party cleavage is healed the party will perish. The new orientation of our politics with a strong Labor party on the left and a modernized Tory party on the right renders it as certain as tomorrow's sunrise. The Liberal rank and file are coming to realize this, and if the leaders were prevented from agreeing they would, we believe, strive hard to agree without them."
