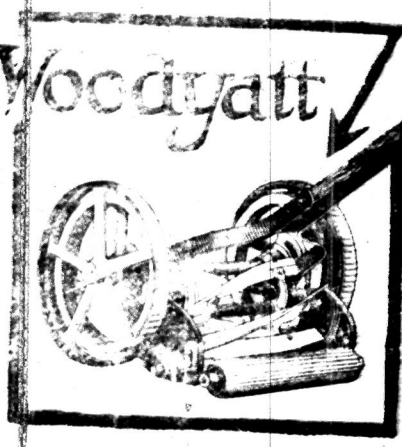

### NEWS TOPICS OF WEEK

#### Important Events Which Have Occurred During the Week.

**The Busy World's Happenings Carefully Compiled and Put Into Handy and Attractive Shape for Perusal by the Readers of Our Paper.**

#### TUESDAY.

Berlin sees play scoring ex-kaiser without objection. Important gasoline strike made at Wainwright, Alberta. London meeting calls for wide plan to develop Empire trade. Lausanne Conference resumes consideration of peace terms. Two trappers found brutally slain in attack Dundas district. New Co-operative formed for marketing honey crop of Ontario. H. Dewar, R.C. blocks passage of Blue Sky's railway bill. St. George's society holds annual dinner at Hart House, Toronto. German workers in Ruhr district demand full pay for all unemployed. Canadian religious census figures show less than one per cent. claim no faith. Government report of farm conditions reports fall wheat in good shape. Cleveland Indians have a clean record in the American League campaign. Man giving name of James Boyd struck by Toronto street car and may not live. Prince of Wales and Ambassador Harvey speak at St. George's society banquet. Hon. Peter Smith gets resolution passed in House for loan of \$35,000,000. Two more children seriously injured when struck down in Toronto streets by motor cars. Promoter Rickard has matched Carpenter and McTigue for the light-heavyweight championship of the world. Bills to incorporate York city, Humberville and Mount Dennis as towns advance through Committee of Whole in Legislature. Hon. Manning Bohnert's bill to encourage consolidation of cheese factories meets Liberal and Conservative criticism owing to clause relating to appraisals.

#### WEDNESDAY.

Assiniboine floods backed up by ice-jams. Canton puts price on W. P. P. head. Toronto Leafs defeat Newark 16 to 5. Man and wife burned to death at Hamilton. Czecho-Slovakia expels Hungarian estate owners. If crop is good in West, cattle will be required from East. Argentina enters team in Davis Cup series for first time. Daughter of Duke of Devonshire to wed son of Earl of Moray. Cleveland Indians lose first game of season to Detroit, 4-0. British Government will refuse to subsidize wheat production in Hon. W. E. Haney's Blue Sky Bill. People of United States aroused at sugar gambler, expecting redress. E. W. Beatty, President of C.P.R. pleads for wider immigration policy. Thirty per cent. of seedling is counted in central and northern Alberta. Free State Government troops sweeping Ireland in search of rebel leaders. Four members of United States Walker Cup team injured on boat on way to England. Turks demand allied evacuation of Constantinople and Chanak at Lausanne Conference. Mount Forest school children offer songs to augment funds for relief of starving Armenians. Babe Ruth makes his second home run of the season, when Yankees beat Washington 4-0. Canadian Order of Foresters may be ordered by commission to increase rates or scale down policies. Traffic kills one man and maims nine others in mid-day on Toronto streets, majority being children, run down by motor cars.

#### THURSDAY.

Cleveland Indians suffer second defeat. New Catholic party being formed in Italy. King confers order of Thistle on Duke of York. Pittsburgh Pirates break Chicago's winning streak. United States seaman slain by Canadian patrol. Sugar prices start soaring in United States market. Branch of Queen's Own Rifles is formed in Australia. Three more expositions of rebels take place in Ireland. Turks at Lausanne conference refused coveted islands. Major Hubbell, M.D., of Thamesville, dies of pneumonia. Toronto Leafs beat Newark 11 to 1, and break even on series. Navy League of Canada calls for defense of Canada's coastline. Proposed tour of Canada by Corinthian soccer team not yet a certainty. Five Toronto doctors elected Fellows of American College of Physicians. United States Walker Cup team players have all entered Gold Cup competition. Parkdale Canoe Club, Toronto, gutted by flames in second fire in less than a week. Bill introduced in Legislature to validate purchase of Toronto suburban radial by city. A baby, wrapped up like a parcel and given to a boy to deliver, is being investigated by the Hull police. Attorney-General states that profits on liquor handled by Government dispensaries are 33 per cent. gross and 20 per cent. net. Government introduces bill to make Dr. F. B. Banting discoverer of work.

#### FRIDAY.

Russian Communists extend party. Toronto in buying stocks of coal to resell to citizens. Prince of Wales attends ball at Lansdowne House. Cleveland again in first place in American League. Turks are counting on big loan from United States. R. E. Schlessinger is new tennis star discovered in Australia. James Dingwall, former Crown Attorney dies at Cornwall. Two women and a child hit by motor vehicles at Toronto. Danish King and Queen observe silver wedding anniversary. Expert tells Commons Committee \$9 Alberta coal is possible here. Canadian Authors' Association opens national convention here. Baltimore Orioles win first game of series from Toronto Leafs, 13 to 0. Weiland Liberals again nominate Robert Cooper, M.P., as candidate. Emigration for women becoming easier, says Archbishop of Canterbury. Second reading of bill giving effect to French treaty carried by 169 majority. Dr. John H. Stone of Parry Sound, widely known as practical philanthropist, dies. Niagara growers plan extensive shipments of high-grade peaches to the west this season. General Board of Presbyterian Church fixes budget at \$1,800,000, an increase of \$300,000 over last year. Many and varying points of view on the conduct of Hydro affairs presented by witnesses before the Gregory Commission. Eastern Canada Live Stock Union present strong case for freight rate changes before meeting of Canadian Freight Association at Toronto. Large amount of live stock feed being imported by Denmark indicates that farmers in that country are not considering decreasing production.

#### SAURDAY.

Death toll in Cochrane typhoid epidemic is 42. Review Journal sells out to Renfrew Mercury. Oxford athletes victorious at Penn relay carnival. Premier Bohnert will go on sea trip for health. Toronto Leafs defeat Baltimore Orioles, 10 to 3. Delegates seek to speed up conference at Lausanne. French astronomer questions earth's rotation about the sun. Secretary Hughes champions world court plan of United States. Hamilton honors soldier dead by planting avenue of elm trees. St. Michael Sadler becomes master at University College, Oxford. Allies give Turks to understand capitulations are still in force. Manitoba Legislature refuses to join in compulsory wheat pool. Roosevelt lead International League in team batting with 342. Moonshine blamed for tragic death of trappers near Fort William. A large part of fisher fleet was destroyed in tidal wave at Kamchatka. Farmers recount tribulation of past year before Agricultural Committee. Robert J. C. Stead of Ottawa elected president of Canadian Authors' Association. Presbyterian General Board plans promotion campaign to raise funds to meet increased budget need. Much of Ontario is now under quarantine in connection with fight against European corn borer. D. A. Cameron, at Canadian Tax Conference, urges replacement of present Federal taxes with a 1 per cent. turnover tax and a gradual income tax. Premier Drury tells House personal investigation proves that workmen on T. & N. O. Railway are not underpaid, as alleged by J. H. Maclean, M.P.P. Sir Adam Beck and Hon. T. W. McGarry refuse to answer questions put by Gregory Commission, which they deem, if answered, would be used for political purposes in present election campaign.

#### MONDAY.

Hon. George P. Graham appointed Minister of Railways and E. M. Macdonald Acting Minister of Defense. Brookville business block swept by \$40,000 fire. Five candidates run for majority at St. Catharines. Vanguard of Hottelites emigrate to St. John, N.B. U.S. astronomical expert says heat of sun is diminishing. Prince of Wales unveils war monument at Belgian capital. Negotiations at Lausanne grow more favorable for peace. Germans discover radio process for forcing aircraft to descend. Hamilton Collegiate team wins two-mile relay at Penn. carnival. Seven lives were lost when ship sinks at Port George, East Africa. Lloyd George, in speech at Manchester, says free trade is in peril. Montreal to play Toronto Broadview Junior basketball championship. Drury Government hopes to wind up business of last session during this week. Toronto Leafs lose on Saturday to Baltimore, but beat Reading, 5-3, on Sunday. Considerable losses from winter killing reported by beekeepers in United States. Chancellor Cuno to meet German Premiers on Tuesday to discuss reparations note. Over 2,000 Oddfellows parade to service at Toronto to mark 104th anniversary of the Order. Toronto Garretts win round and Ontario intermediate basketball championship from Stratford. Bolton Wanderers win English Soccer Cup by beating West Ham United in final, 2-0, before crowd of 200,000. Story of how Britain quietly rescued 57,000 Armenian refugees during the war is told by Canadian who was member of forces in charge of work.

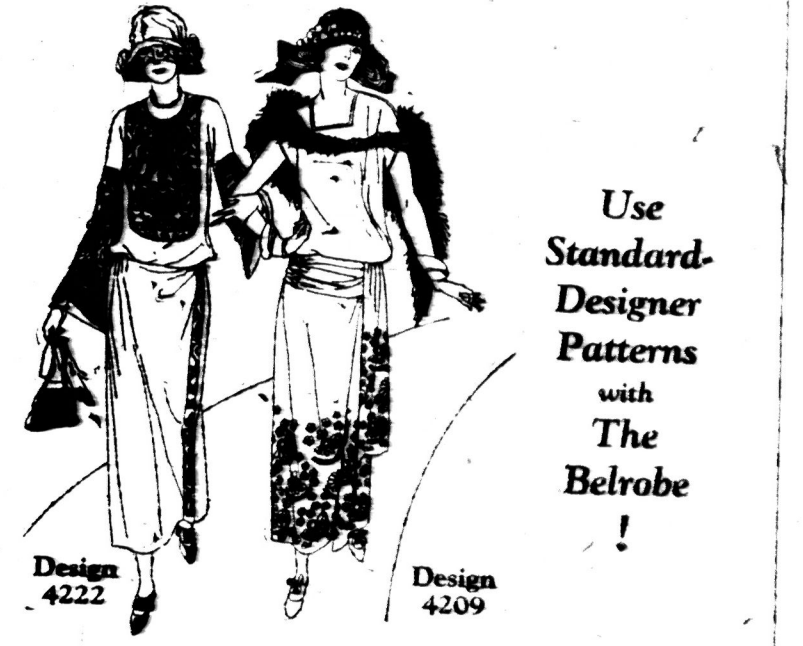
