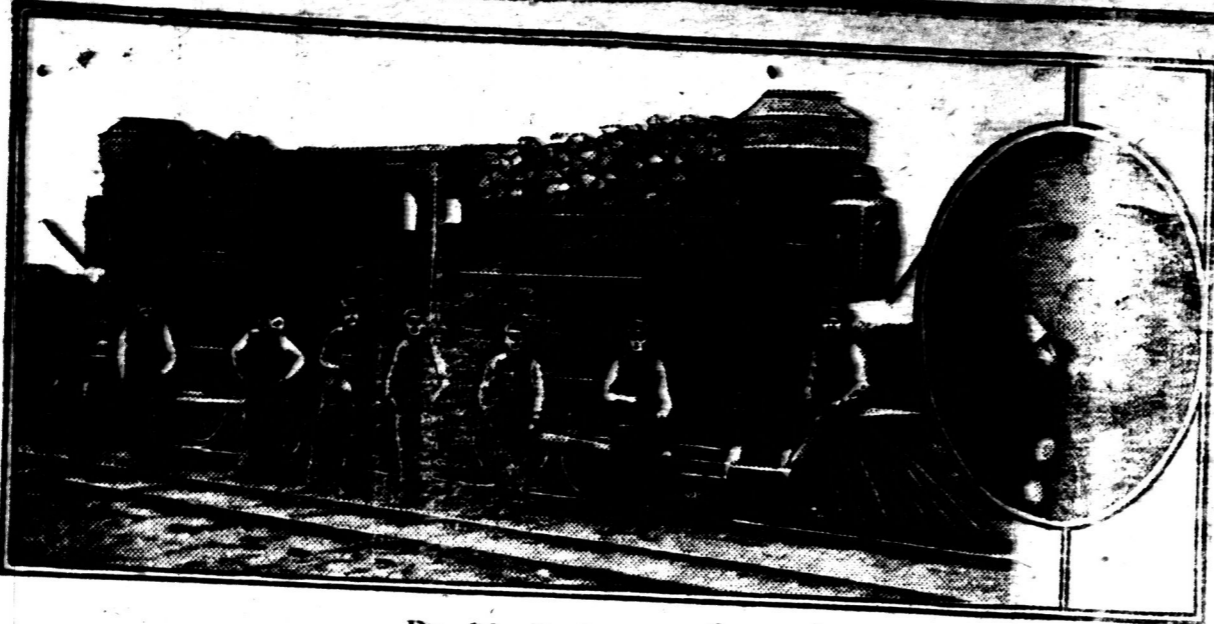

BOXING THE COMPASS

Seeding in Alberta was two weeks later this year than '21.

A second party of Swiss immigrants recently arrived at St. John and for the West, where they will engage in agriculture.

Twenty-two thousand immigrants to Canada from the United States were inspected on trains and highways crossing the 38 points from Port Arthur to Kingsgate, B.C., during March of this year.

To date the port of Vancouver has shipped or booked 17,000,000 bushels of wheat to the Orient and South America. The railroads expect at least 2,500,000 additional bushels to be shipped this way in the near future.

The memory of the early missionaries of the Oblate Order will be commemorated by the Canadian Pacific Railway, and several stations on the extensions of their lines between Winnipeg and Quince will bear names of early members of that organization which did so much for the colonization of the country.

There are thirteen new paper making machines being installed in Canadian paper mills this year. When erected and running full these machines will consume more than 350,000 additional cords of wood a year. Canada is already annually consuming and exporting more than 5,000,000 cords of pulpwood, representing the growth of a century or more on 1,250,000 acres of land.

A new service for motor tourists desiring to pass between the mainland and Vancouver Island has been inaugurated between Bellinham and Victoria. The Motor Princess, with a capacity for fifty automobiles and 250 passengers, plies twice daily between the ports, each with a motor driven and the first of its kind to be operated on the Pacific side of the continent.

In 1922 Canada produced 2,618 tons of salt cake, valued at \$5,394, and 1,329 tons of Glauber salts valued at \$42,719, according to government figures. There are a number of immense deposits of Glauber salts in the province of Saskatchewan, which are at the present time only in the initial stages of development, but it is anticipated that the next few years will see a considerable increase in production.

The Canadian exhibit at the British Empire Exhibition, to be held in London from April 20th to October 31st, 1924, is financially controlled and directed by the Department of Government. The estimated cost is \$1,000,000. The two Canadian railroads are planning exhibits on adjoining sites, each with a floor space of 16,000 feet. The cost of the Canadian Pacific exhibit is estimated at \$500,000.

The Canadian Pacific steamship "Empress of Russia" upon her last sailing, carried a shipment of Chinese frogs for Japan. Cool spots were reserved in the hold of the ship, and the travelers were well packed in ice. On being taken ashore at Yokohama these frogs will be gradually warmed until they are ready to be let loose, when they will be liberated on the lower Japanese islands and the travelers will be giving the Japanese a new variety in the production of frogs here.

Railway News

Toronto.—It is announced that G. S. Beer, C. P. R. city passenger agent, under District Passenger Agent William Fulton, has been promoted to the post of assistant district passenger agent for Mr. Fulton now has two assistants in his territory.

Medicine Hat, Alberta.—An expenditure of about \$50,000 is represented by the extension to Canadian Pacific Railway roundhouse at Medicine Hat. The construction of the new roundhouse, which is about equally divided between two improvements, has given much employment to local men and there is still a considerable amount of inside work to be done in connection with the extension to the roundhouse.

Benbow, Ontario.—Mr. Ed. Williams, Canadian Pacific Railway baggage master, who in addition to his regular duties, takes care of the much favored summer travelers, has just been notified that his plot has been awarded second prize in the Quebec district, all of the district prizes having been recently judged by the past few years. Mr. Williams has carried off a number of prizes but the competition is growing keener year by year.

St. Thomas, Ontario.—Work has been commenced on the reconstruction of an extension to the present C.P.R. yard east of the city, in the form of an 800-foot repair track at an expenditure of approximately \$15,000. The grading work which is being done by Irwin and Son of this city was started recently. The extension is necessary to cope with the increased business and also to facilitate the repairing of cars. It is also understood that the addition of the new tracks will result in several more employees being added to the C.P.R. repair gang.

A small track about 80 feet long will also be erected alongside the new tracks to be used in case of an emergency. The new track will hold at least forty cars. Four teams and about twenty men are engaged in rushing this work to completion.

Belfast, Ireland.—For the first time on record a Canadian-bound steamer sailed from Belfast Lough conveying mails direct from the Northern capital. The vessel was the Canadian Pacific Railway Company's S.S. "Metagama," which, incidentally, was built in Belfast. The ship was chartered off Kiloport and 23 bags of mail, together with some 100 emigrants from Ulster, were conveyed to it by the Harbor Commissioners' tug "Musgrave."

It should be noted that the practice of sending the mails to Liverpool and other ports, from which they were despatched, but acting on instructions from the secretary of the Post Office in London, the present system.

RANEY HAS RESIGNED

Attorney-General of Ontario Leaves Public Life.

His Formal Announcement Was Made to the U.F.O. Executive in His Own Constituency — Premier Duffy Is Not Ready to Make Any Statement Regarding His Plans.

TORONTO, May 7.—The action that the government is to take upon the resignation of the Attorney-General is not yet determined. Hon. Mr. Drury stated that the matter was so far from settled, between the Attorney-General and himself, and exact as to his resignation upon the course which he was to follow.

"Mr. Raney," Hon. Mr. Drury said, "placed a letter in my hands stating his desire to resign from public life and offering to give up his resignation either now or to stay until after the election. I have not yet decided what course I shall take."

The resignation of the Attorney-General, yet come before the Ontario Cabinet, and there is yet to be learned, therefore, the attitude which his colleagues of the Executive Council will take in regard to it.

Hon. Mr. Raney's intention to retire from the political field was formally stated in the following letter which was read on Saturday afternoon to a meeting of the U.F.O. Executive, which gathered at Forgue, in his riding of East Wellington. It was addressed to J. A. Douglas, of Mount Forest, and read:

"Toronto, 3rd May, 1923.
"Dear Mr. Douglas: Since you were here the other day I have given further consideration to the question we were then discussing of my candidature for East Wellington, and I have been compelled reluctantly to decide not to seek a re-nomination for a seat in the next Legislature. Will you please communicate the fact to the executive meeting, its meeting at Forgue on Saturday?"

"As I explained to you, my reasons for this decision are altogether personal, and have no reference to any question of the policy or record of the present administration, which I will continue to support in any way in my power."

"I shall, of course, want to attend your convention. I am sure to be absent from Toronto for a couple of weeks after the House rises and that is the reason why I suggested the week of the convention. My retirement may make it desirable to take a little more time for the selection of a candidate and the executive may perhaps decide that the week of the 21st will be time enough. If not, as I said in my letter, I shall endeavor to accommodate myself to the date chosen by the executive."

Hon. Mr. Raney was appointed Attorney-General on November 14, 1919, when Premier Drury found himself placed in power without a sufficient representation among his supporters, and after the position had been declined by the present Conservative member for Kingston, Connelley, K.C. He has been much in the forefront of the political life of the province ever since, more particularly with respect to what may be called purely social legislation. His enforcement of the O.T.A. has been his most notable achievement, and the passing of the bill providing for the publication of betting odds, his most objectionable to destroy handbook betting.

WANTS TO ENTER CANADA.
Labor Agitator Barred and Makes Official Protest.

HOUSTON, Maine, May 7.—Alexander Howat, deposed president of the Kansas district of the United Mine Workers of America, left Sunday night for New York with the avowed purpose of resuming his fight for admission to Canada.

Howat, while on his way to address meetings of the coal miners in Cape Breton, was detained at McAdam Junction, N.B., by the Canadian immigration authorities and later the Department of Immigration at Ottawa ruled he could not enter the Dominion.

"The action of the Canadian authorities in denying me admission to the country is an outrage," Howat said before leaving. "If I am refused any other working man can be refused admission when there is no just cause."

Howat said that his appeal from the Canadian immigration ruling was filed with the agent of McAdam Junction, April 25. He said that in spite of efforts made in his behalf by the Kansas State Department and scores of mine workers' unions, the Commissioner of Immigration at Ottawa steadily refused to state the grounds why admission was refused.

Had a Weak Heart.
SIMCOE, May 7.—After fifteen minutes deliberation of the jury investigating the death of Mrs. Gordon Butler, who died following the collapse of shelves in Leary's grocery, on Peel Street, arrived at the following conclusion:

"That Mrs. Butler came to her death owing to her personal condition, a defective heart, and that no evidence was produced attaching blame for negligence to any person or persons."

Eye-witnesses of the accident stated that Mrs. Butler's feet were caught beneath the cans and bottles, but that she apparently suffered no injury other than the slight arm bruise which the doctors found.

The jurymen were: D. T. McGill, foreman; O. Burnham, R. Croft, Groot, Schuyler, C. A. Turvey, A. Smith, and G. S. Foggy.

Reduction in Letter Postage.
OTTAWA, April 30.—The Government has been advised that on and after May 14, the postage on letters from Great Britain to any part of the Empire, Egypt, the United States, and the British West Indies, will be reduced to three half-pennies for the first ounce and one penny for each additional ounce.

Fire in Alberta.
EDMONTON, April 30.—Serious prairie fires are burning on the Hbema Indian Reserve, south of Hbema, a large amount of timber and several barns belonging to the Indians have been burned.

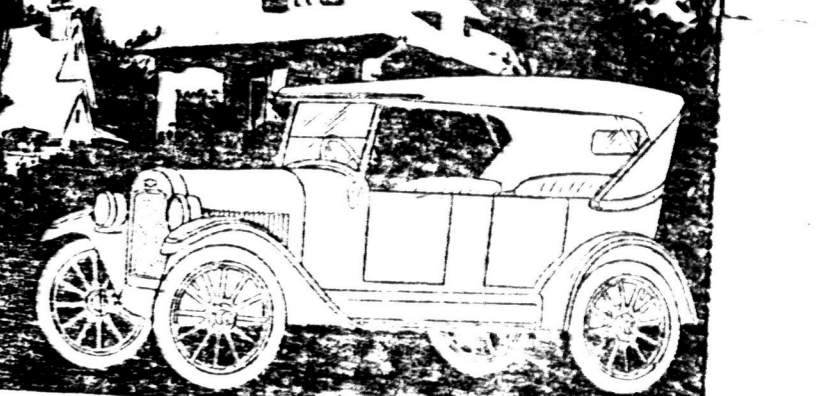
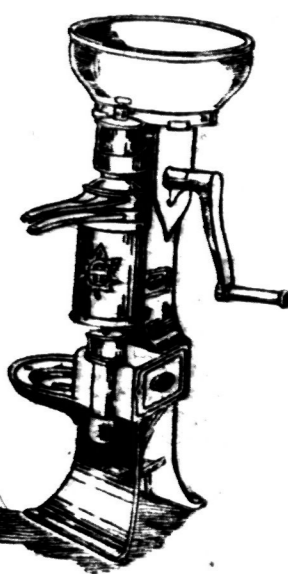
