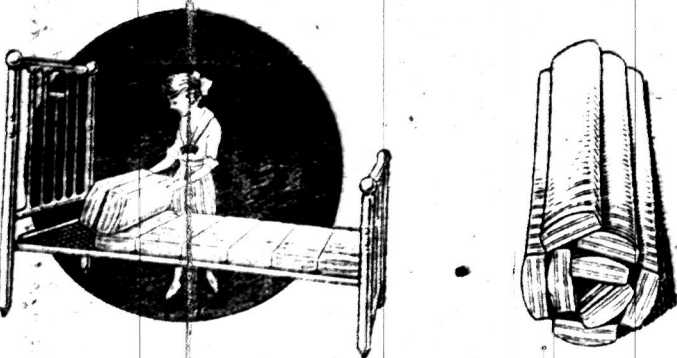

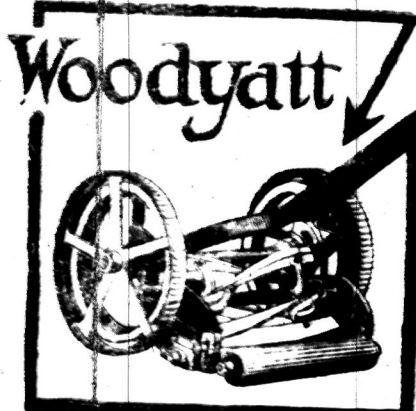

Toronto Leafs defeat Reading by 13 to 9.  
Shuffle pending in Quebec Liquor Commission.
