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MANY CANDIDATES SEEK HONORS IN JUNE ELECTION

Toronto, May 15.—From the number of candidates now in the field for the seats in the Legislature, it may be estimated that the final list will average three per constituency. The Conservatives got away in the lead, but the U. F. O. conventions were numerous last week and this. The Liberals have had a good deal of difficulty. One or two nominating conventions have been postponed. The candidates selected by South Perth Liberals was absent at the time, and has subsequently declined the honor. Edwin Parker, chosen in North Oxford two weeks ago, has now withdrawn. Former Mayor E. A. Horton, of St. Thomas, who accepted the Liberal nomination in West Elgin, did so on receiving assurance "in black and white" that the association would take care of campaign expenses. A Liberal candidate in North Brant is considered unlikely, and there is no hope of any organization of the party in South Norfolk, where John S. Martin of Fort Dover, is in the field for the Conservatives, and Joseph Criddle has been nominated by the U. F. O.

SUBFOCATED IN CABIN

Fumigation Caused the Death of a Young Sailor.

SARNIA, April 20.—Asphyxiated by hydrocyanic fumes from a preparation used in fumigating, Wallace F. Lavis, aged 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Lavis, 21 Davis street, Sarnia, Ont., was found dead on Sunday morning in a cabin of the crew's quarters on the Northern Navigation passenger steamer *Huronic*, lying at the Point Edward docks.

The particular cabin in which he was found had been fumigated at 11 o'clock by O. V. Johnson of the Knox Extermination Company, Cleveland, who placed the preparation in the cabin after according to his statement to the coroner, he had entered four times and examined the windows. His conviction that the cabin was empty at the time.

How Lavis came to enter the cabin is not understood by the officers of the boat, who declare that a warning of fumigating operations had been issued at supper time Saturday by the steward and that Lavis was warned when he came off watch at 2:20 Sunday morning by W. J. McQuaig, the first mate.

Lavis was missed from his place at the dinner table and a search revealed his body in the upper bunk, with one arm and a leg hanging over the side.

Lavis had been employed on the *Huronic* for five seasons, and was a single man.

Depottee Arrives in England

LONDON, May 14.—An O'Brien who was deported from England after the Maritz raids, as an Irish agitator, arrived at midnight Sunday at Holyhead, where he was handed to Scotland Yard detectives by four Scottish Free State officers.

When leaving Dublin O'Brien professed that he was not allowed to travel first class. He also wanted to be taken to Manchester. His escort ignored his protest and brought him to Holyhead third-class.

It is understood that O'Brien will be brought to London, where it is expected he will remain in custody pending a decision by the House of Lords on the validity of the deportation which followed the raids.

Bandits to be Sold

PEKIN, May 14.—The Pekin Government announced that it delegates reached terms at London Saturday night with the bandits, under which the troops will be withdrawn and the bandits later will be executed in a national arena.
