toms and Excise. OTTAWA, May 14.—The dates on which tariff and revenue changes take effect under the new budget proposals are set forth in a memorandum to collectors of customs and excise issued by the department here Saturday night. The changes are held to be in ef-

feet as follows: (a) Customs tariff changes in effeet on May 12, in respect of goods imported or taken out of warehouse consumption on and after that day, and goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption

was made before that day. (b) Changes in Inland Revenue Act as respects cigarettes in effect on May 12. As respects the repeal of section 378, excise tax on sugar produced in Canada from sugar beets, in effect from January 1, 1923.

(c) Changes in Special War Revenue Act, 1915, and amending Acts, in effect August 1, 1923 except the provision proposed by section 2 of the resolution re excise tax on wines of all kinds, except sparkling wines, etc., to come into effect on a date to be fixed by proclamation of the Governor-in-Council. The changes which come into effect on August 1 are those cencerning the stamp tree. on cheques and receipts, and the

Trotsky Says That Russians Are Prepared to Fight.

Mobs Hang Lord Curson in Effigy in the Streets of Moscow, But Soviet Leaders Propose a Conference Effort Will be Made to Prevent International Breach.

MOSCOW, May 14.-While thousands of demonstrators marched ing effigies of Lord Curzon, the British Foreign Secretary, and crying "down with war," Tchitcherin and Trotsky, the Soviet leaders, speaking at a great mass meeting of the Moscow Seviet, declared that Russia's reply to the British ultimatum would be an effort to avoid a break in the relations, if possible.

We offer England a conference." said M. Tchitcherin, urging Russia to act in such a manner as not to yield to provocation, so that if a preak comes, the responsibility will not be Russia's. We shall not utter a word to

hamper negotiations," said War Minister Trotsky, "and will by all means try to keep peace. But if war comes he Red army is ready." Tchitcherin, dressed in the uniform of a member of the Red army, and wearing a red decoration, was the chief speaker at the meeting, held in

The theatre was crowded to the doors, while, in the streets thousands listened to the speakers from motor trucks and balconies, all of whom made references to what they termed the war threat against Russia in the British note; in the assassination of Vorovsky at Lausanne, and in other

Referring to Vorovsky, M. Toltcherin said "This is a symptom of the general European situation. The direct responsibility rests with the Swiss Government, which took no preventive measures, while the moral responsibility is on England. France and Italy, who originally invited the Russian delegation to Lausanne.' Regarding the British note, which

he characterized as insolent, Tchitcherin said: "We are getting telegrams that British warships are aiready in the White Sea; perhaps by now they have opened hostilities against our ships. The note contains false facts and messages improperly deciphered, but the chief point to be considered in the eastern question. We must reply calmiy and firmly. Russia will not yield, but we should not yield to

provocation and act in a manner oringing sname upon ourselves. "Russia will not go back a single step before the demands; we therefore offer a conference. We are ready to discuss the losses sustained by British citizens in 1920, but we will render a bill to England for all those England shot during the intervention in the north. We desire peace, and do not want a break, but

we will wait until the enemy attacks The Foreign Minister was followed by War Minister Trotsky, who told the cheering throng that Russia wants peace, but the Red army was ready, if necessary. "If war comes it will be a long

one; it will delay the building up of our country for many years, but the Red army, which wants peace, will carry out its duty until the end." Lea Kamieneff, the acting Premier and President of the Moscow Soviet, paid tribute to Vorovsky. The bullet which killed him was directed not

only against Vorovsky, but against the Soviet Government, the Communist party and the entire labor move-"We swear to take revenge," he dectared. Let our enemies think what they like, but they will not frighten us by builets or notes. We will continue our liberation of the

east and the west." M. Bucharin, head of the left wing of the Soviet central committee, in more beiligerent tone, said that the capitalist powers constituted a barbarous civilization. We are telling them to go to nell," he shouted.

The meeting adopted a resolution to send a letter to J. Ramsey Mac-Donald, leader of the labor organization in the British House of Commons, declaring that Russia would not yield to an ultimatum, but was ready to come to an agreement if Great Britain was ready to negotiate, and also a letter to Dr. Nangen, head of the League of Nations in Russia asking arm to use his influence against a preak and possible

The rubie aropped sharply Saturday, particularly in private trading. Some stabilization set in later. During the street demonstration Saturday troops stood directly in front of the door of the British mission, and at lunch hour the mission, thus strongly protected, was the quietest place in Moscow.

A few young Communists haited haif a block from the mission and eried: "Let us get at them." Special state police and cavairy troops smartly mounted drew a cordon around the mission, and the demonstrators remained at a distance. The marchers numbered no fewer certainly than 50.000.

Krupps' Sentence Hiegai. PARIS, May 14.—It has been discovered the sentence of twenty years' imprisonment passed by Frence court-martial on Dr. Gustav Krupp

He will be taken to St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary to serve his sentance.
