### NEWS TOPICS OF WEEK

#### Important Events Which Have Occurred During the Week.

The Busy Week's Happenings Carefully Compiled and Put into Handy and Attractive Shape for Perusal by the Readers of Our Paper.

#### TUESDAY.

Fake buying orders flood Wall Street market. Jesse Sweetser beaten in British tourney by Layton. Combined Bill for second reading in the Commons. Toronto International drub Reading by 9 to 2 at Toronto. Hint at bad faith in removal of ban on Canadian cattle. Late Hon. W. C. Kennedy left an estate valued at \$645,223. Sixty-three entries have been received for the Toronto Cup. Most powerful wireless station in world inaugurated in Ontario. Magnificent new cathedral of Scottish rite dedicated at Hamilton. Over two-thirds of spring grain seeding is completed in Ontario. King George and Queen Mary are welcomed with enthusiasm in Rome. Bonar Law, cruising in Mediterranean, may go to Rome during royal visit. Nine-dollar freight rate on Alberta coal to Toronto considered prohibitive. Labor plans to place candidates for Provincial election in four Toronto ridings. Fire at warehouse of Stauntons Limited, Toronto, does \$15,000 damage. Expanding Canada. Chinese bandits drove 12 foreigners to hills in Shantung; women are released. Montreal judge decides that plot of play taken from life cannot be copyrighted. Dog poisoners are at work in Markham and six animals have died within the last few days. Miss George's Harding, who was struck by a motor car on April 30, dies in a Toronto hospital. Population of York township now 40,509, an increase of 4,000 in past year, according to official figures.

#### WEDNESDAY.

Florence Carlisle, Canadian painter, dies in England. First contingent from the Hebrides placed on Middlesex farms. David James, former reeve of Markham, dies at Thornhill. York Klippers lengthen their lead in the Ontario League. George Lane of Calgary states that western crop prospects are excellent. Krupp's president sentenced to 15 years in prison by French court-martial. Progressive amendment would permit banks with \$50,000 capital to start operations. Sir Henry Thornton comments on failure of operators to co-operate in reducing coal costs. Britain sends ultimatum to Russia on propaganda in Orient and mis-treatment of British. George E. Gibbard, of Toronto, founder of the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association, is dead. Canadian butter and cheese output in 1923 surpassed that of New Zealand and the British market says expert. Dr. Sylvester Adams, who laid claim to having opened the first genius furnishing store in Toronto, is dead. Players eliminated from British amateur championship tournament at Deal. Couple at Toronto, seeks two marriage licenses in order that they may have a legal remarriage by two different clergyman. Pitcher Alexander of Chicago Nationalists sets new record by not walking or hitting a batsman in five consecutive games. British Government issues statement deploring French precipitancy in sending reply to Berlin without allies' signature. Of the Methodist Book Room's surplus for year, \$24,756, it was decided to devote \$15,000 to the superannuation fund for ministers. Mrs. Mary Rosenfeldt struck on Toronto sidewalk by automobile and dragged 81 feet, dies in hospital from injuries. Driver of car seen scene and has not yet been caught. Woman accused of kidnaping baby of another patient at Toronto hospital cries out piteously when infant is taken from her and seems under hallucination it is her own child.

#### THURSDAY.

Budget may restore pre-war postal rates. Wheat showing up through ground in Alberta. English cricket team to play in Toronto next September. King George and Queen Mary pay visit to Pope at Vatican. Soviet gunboat seizes another British trawler off Marazion coast. Britain to increase air defense force. Duke of Devonshire says: Turks refuse to adjourn Lausanne Conference over Ascension Day. German murder gang chief sentenced to death in Ruhr district. Nova Scotia insists on sixteen seats in Commons after redistribution. E. W. Beatty, K.C., resigns as Chancellor of Queen's University. Lloyd George says British Empire is trust to be developed for human progress. Lord Robert Cecil gives statement of the United States visit on League mission. Government Forestry Station in Norfolk reclaiming much waste land by reforestation. Edward Pearson, after escaping from House of Refuge, is found dead under piece of carpet. All United States entrants eliminated from British women's open golf championship tournament. E. W. Holderness, last year's British amateur golf champion, is eliminated from present tournament. Starting statistics on family descents in Ontario given in report before Social Service Council of Ontario.

#### FRIDAY.

First wheat is up in Brandon district. British Free State refuses to make terms with rebels. Social Service Council of Ontario concludes its sessions. Thornton presents reasons for C.N.R. operating K.C. dies in Brandon. Perce union grocers are forced to seed land for a third time. Women propose sugarless day for Canada to stop rise in prices. Etienne defeats France by 4 to 1 in international soccer match. South American Republic increasing naval and military strength. Expedition sends gunboat to Mar-mansk coast to protest against Russian Soviet delegates. St. Malo fishermen admit ten days on open Atlantic tell thrilling tale. J. W. Lowry, K.C., dies in Brandon after practicing law for 60 years. Aeroplane patrols proposed to check bank robberies in western Canada. Philadelphia Athletics move up to third place in American League standing. Only half a dozen towns bordering the city will follow Toronto's lead in adopting day-after saving. Miss Joyce Wetherill, former British women's open golf champion, is eliminated from tournament. Expanding California is second to make new grove's essential to company in British Columbia. Struck by a train at Windsor and seriously injured, David Goldstein, was brought to the Western Hospital, Toronto. Dog in Oshawa found gnawing at a dismembered leg of a young child, and limb gives indications of foul play; police authorities think.

#### SATURDAY.

Hon. W. S. Fielding brings in his budget. Limitation maple syrup sold by Canadian retailers. New York Boxing Commission bars "rabbit punch". Wetherill defeats Gurnet in English golf tourney. William A. Hale, founder of Ontario racket, dies at Hamilton. Switzerland repudiates all responsibility for death of Vorovsky. Cy Williams, Philadelphia, drives out three homers runs in one game. Montreal is asked to help Vancouver to secure shipping facilities. Rumors from Bulgaria tell of revolutionary movement; details lacking. Russian Soviet refuses to accept British ultimatum and proposes arbitration. Discovery in New York of conspiracy of citizens to disrupt rallies by poison attacks. Two little lovers, aged 14, eluded for kissing, drown themselves at Paris, France. Mrs. John R. McDonald of Stratford, Ont., celebrates her hundredth birthday. G. C. Halcrow, former labor member of Legislature, refuses to accept labor nomination in Hamilton. Presidentially no injury from recent frost to fruit in the Niagara district. Prospects for most lines are reported as fair. When his head came in contact with wire carrying 4,000 volts, life of David (Lennie) Cole, Toronto man, is saved by his safety belt. Secretary of Toronto Typographical Union replies to statement of nationalities that proposed Canadian Copyright Act increases piracy of their books in Canada. Chief Justice William Atlock expresses surprise when jury awards \$1,800 to a woman of pregnant suit against W. W. McKee.

#### SUNDAY.

Ridley team beats Toronto C.C. eleven. New York Giants defeat Pittsburgh by 9 to 0. Rochester Colts win two games from Jersey City. Kent county being scoured by police for illicit liquor. Roger Wetherill wins British amateur golf championship. Arrest at New York of suspect in explosion in Wall Street. A reduction in arrears prepared in west of this year is reported. Russian Soviet desires for peace, but have arms trade war. Big demonstration in Moscow against ultimatum sent by Britain. Canadian is organizer of conferences by C.N.R. to T.C. corporation. Communist parade at London headed by English church, sang hymns. Lincoln county receives job's wages, as promised has released his work. Reversid's health disappointing, up by defeating Western Mustang team, 4 to 0. Farmers near Marlin taking steps to discourage stockmarketing in Marlin, Shute, Tenn. Lins Fells and Jess Williams, winners of main bouts at Marlin, Riverdale Amateur Club, Eastern Canada open season, are all champions. Abraham Martin, first K. K. in Canada, is honored by the National Council at Quebec. J. J. Burns, former secretary of the Naval Veterans' Association, is arrested in Tampa, N.S. Two-year-old Georgetown boy following his father to work falls through railway bridge and is killed. Michael Miller, from the west, leaves wife and family at Union Station, Toronto, to buy tobacco and drops off six children at school. Members of rank and file of Conservative party said to be demanding a definite stand on O.T.A. enforcement from Leader Hon. G. Howard Ferguson.
