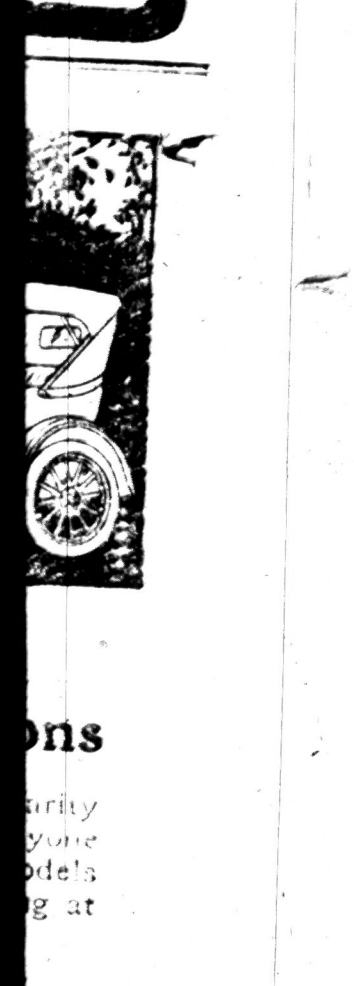

WALNUT INVESTMENT It Pays to Plant Walnuts and Wait Fifty Years.

No Better Legacy for the Farm Lad—The Government Forestry Branch Will Assist—Tree-Growing Requires Little Labor—Black Walnut Trees As Memorials—How to Treat Poison Ivy.

Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture (Toronto). "Say, Mr. Forester, if a boy of my age were to plant an acre of black walnut this spring would I live to see the trees large enough to be used for the building of a house to shelter me in my old age?"

"Yes, my lad, you could plant the trees to-day, and in fifty years time the trees would be large enough to cut into interior finishing lumber for your house."

There is some satisfaction in planting a tree and watching it grow to a merchantable size. A Walnut Tree Grows for Many Years.

A walnut tree will keep growing long after it has passed the half-century mark, and keeps on making timber until it is one hundred and twenty years old.

No Better Legacy Could Be Left. A man could leave no better legacy for his heirs than a block of good timber.

The Forestry Branch of the Lands and Forestry Department is co-operating with four hundred Ontario farmers in which the Forestry officials try to point the way to success in wood land management.

ROGERS STILL AT LARGE. He May Attempt to Commit Two More Murders.

NORTH BAY, May 21.—After five days of freedom, during which he has terrorized the entire county from North Bay south to Powassan and east to Mattawa, Leo Rogers, ex-convict and murderer of Constable Fred Lafleur, has the police forces of North Bay and the province completely baffled.

The police are faced with two theories of his present whereabouts. He is either lying somewhere in the bush between Mattawa and Bonfield, or he has sought a flight out of the district.

In the first case it is believed he will again make his appearance in North Bay to complete his crowded murder sentence in a little over seven years ago.

Even the Town Hall and Police Station at North Bay are guarded at night. Every road between North Bay and Mattawa is patrolled by a unique special constable equipped with rifle and hand gun.

John Rogers, father of Leo Rogers, is in jail charged with aiding and abetting the escape of his son. It is alleged that Rogers obtained the special Wagoner title from his son on a four-acre tract that had been away from the district ever since.

TRIED TO SHOOT OFFICER. Ottawa Man Was Being Arrested for Stealing Auto. HAMILTON, May 21.—Constable Fournier, Ottawa, early this morning attempted to take the life of Constable Fournier, who was being arrested for stealing a car.

Folks Generally Enjoy Public Singing—Music Always Popular in the Country—Community Singing Encourages All Present—Vary the Program From Grave to Gay.

Another Rumor Natted. LONDON, England, May 21.—A rumor concerning the forthcoming resignation of the Prince of Wales has been followed by a prompt denial.

BONAR LAW STEPS OUT. British Premier Resigns on Account of Ill-Health.

Lord Curzon is Expected to Be His Successor, and Rumor Says That Aspin Chamberlain and Sir L. Bland, Who Went into the Wilderness with Lloyd George, May Enter Cabinet.

LONDON, May 21.—Prime Minister Bonar Law, after but about seven months in office, on Sunday, resigned the Premiership on account of ill-health. It is definitely stated here in the best informed political circles that Foreign Minister Curzon will succeed him.

Sir Frederick Sykes, the Premier's son-in-law, and Col. R. Waterhouse, his private secretary, conveyed the resignation to King George at Alderley Wood, and Sunday evening Downing Street rumor was general through the following statement:

Mr. Bonar Law's resignation did not turn to London yesterday when he was examined by medical advisers, who signed the following statement: "In spite of his rest the Prime Minister's voice is still unsatisfactory, and we are unable to promise an improvement within a reasonable time."

King George received a letter from Mr. Bonar Law in which the retiring Premier said that he was unable to accept the recommendation of his medical advisers to resign the Premiership, and as First Lord of the Treasury.

Accepting the Premier's resignation King George expressed the deepest regret and inquired solicitously of Mr. Bonar Law's health. The Premier was general throughout, saying that he was suffering from a cancer of the throat.

Mr. Bonar Law's throat trouble is not malignant, according to the London Times parliamentary correspondent, who also says that there is every reason to hope that his health will in time be restored.

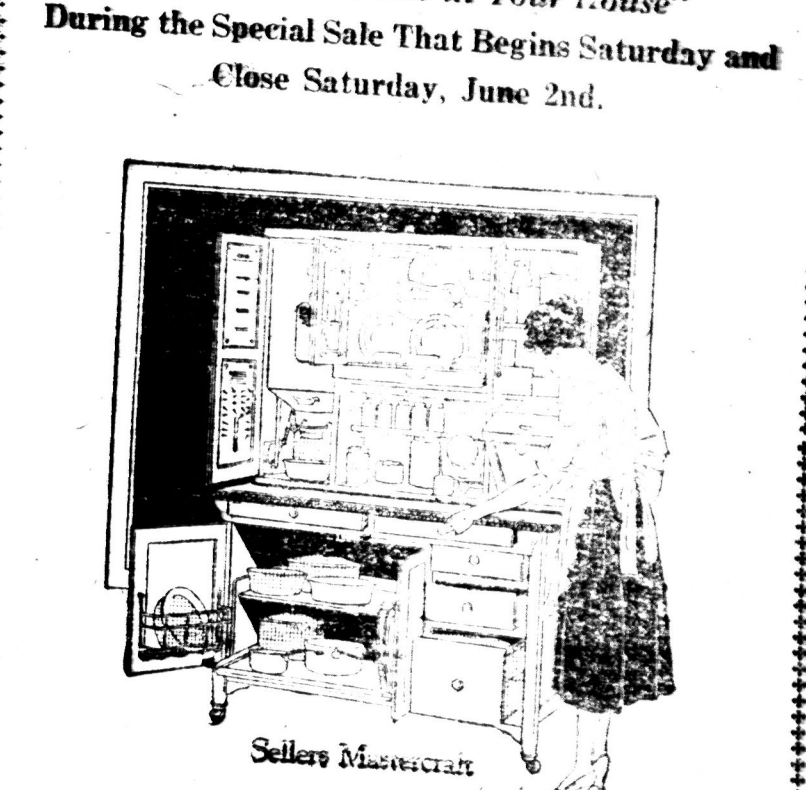
Attorney-General Will Not Retire from Provincial Politics. He Has Accepted the U.F.O. Nomination in East Wellington and Will Continue to Support Premier Drury—His Friends Are Satisfied With His Enforcement of the O.T.A.

FERGUSON, May 21.—After writing three weeks ago to the secretary of the U.F.O. executive committee that he would not allow his name to be put again before the voters of East Wellington, Hon. W. E. Raney, Premier Drury's Attorney-General, on Saturday afternoon returned to Ferguson at a meeting of the executive committee.

After calling the meeting to order, President J. A. Douglas, proceeded to break the news that Mr. Raney had agreed to the plan of the association, declaring that if the people of East Wellington wanted him, "he was willing to serve as their representative."
