Marshall, grant for relief of Cochrane typhoid epidemic, \$10; Dr. Jacques, inspection of schools, \$100; Canada Ingot Iron company, culverts, \$102.92; Sawyer Masey company, lawyer, \$22.94; Dominion Road Machinery, repairs, \$87.28; J. Y. Shutter, 1050 feet oak plank @ \$60, \$630; S. Carpe, 1,425 feet oak plank @ \$69, \$98,350; \$1; E. H. Miller work on Road 18, Division 58, \$22; W. J. Lindsay, express and supplies, \$3.98; on account of salary, \$100.

Shoup-Waterbury: Resolved that a bill be granted to alter the boundary of School Section No. 15, Walpole and Rainham, and the same be now read a first time - Carried.

By-law read a second and third time, passed, signed, numbered and entitled a by-law as in the original motion.


Saunders-Waterbury: Resolved that we make a grant of \$10 to the Canadian Red Cross society for Northern relief of Typhoid epidemic - Carried.

Shoup-Laidlaw: Resolved that the clerk be instructed to have the township by-laws revised and printed, about 200 copies - Carried.

Waterbury-Saunders: Resolved that we do now adjourn to meet Saturday, June 16, at 10 o'clock a.m., in the Walpole Fire Insurance hall, Jarvis, for Court of Revision of the assessment roll and for general business of the township - Carried.
