ACTUAL WORK OF BRINGING HYDRO TO JARVIS HAS BEEN STARTED BY ENGINEER OF ONTARIO COMMISSION

Official Holds Conference With Department of Highways Engineer Regarding Line From Hagersville--Road Not of Ordinary Width

Work Will Be Rushed to Give Residents Gift of Light and Power For Christmas--Material For Plant Is on Way and Is Expected Soon

The first steps towards the actual installation of hydro in Jarvis were taken Wednesday.

Engineer Jones, of the Ontario Hydro Electric commission arrived here Tuesday night and Wednesday conferred with an engineer of the department of highways regarding the line to bring the power from Hagersville. He will begin to survey the village for the installation Thursday.

Considerable difficulty regarding bringing the power from Hagersville was anticipated because of the narrowness of the road, which is only 55 feet wide instead of the usual 66 feet, the regulation width. Another obstacle is that there are poles now on both sides of the road.
