A Nanticoke couple appeared in court here before Magistrate Massie on a charge of neglecting their child.

The case was entered by the Children's Aid society, but the magistrate found the evidence insufficient to warrant him ordering the child removed from the home.

They were both warned, however, that better care must be taken of the child and that the home must be cleaned. Another child of the couple died a couple of weeks ago.

Charles R. Bilger, secretary of the Children's Aid society conducted the prosecution. The man, according to the evidence, had not worked steadily for some time. He was told he would have to work every day in the future if he wanted to avoid another charge being made against him.

Wadel were nominated, but the following withdrew: T. J. Craven, G. F. Fissette, M. McLennan, R. Wolfe, S. Wadel. Four members will be elected from the number. The elections will be held next Monday, December 3, when the Hydro by-law will also be voted on.

At the meeting all nominees and categoryers were unanimous for the by-law and committees were appointed to get out the vote and try to carry it unanimously. J. A. Toohy, village clerk, was chairman.

MATERIAL HERE FOR HYDRO LINE

Four Car Loads Arrive at G. T. R.—More Is Sent to Hagersville

Tangible signs of Hydro in Jarvis were seen Monday when four car loads of material arrived on the Grand Trunk.

A similar amount of material, wire and poles, has arrived in Hagersville for the line to bring the power from that town to Jarvis.

The cars have already been unloaded and the work of erecting the lines will be started next week. It is expected that the installation will not take much longer than a couple of weeks.

The Hydro Commission of Ontario will send men in sufficient numbers to rush the work of erecting the line from here to Hagersville and constructing the local plant and wiring the village.

When the representatives of the company were here last they left instructions that they be notified as soon as the material had arrived, saying they would start the work as soon as the wires and poles were here. That has been done.

EDITOR'S WIDOW IS CALLED BY DEATH

An old resident of Caledonia died on Thursday at her home 56, Holton Ave., South, Hamilton, in the person of Mrs. Anne J. Sawle. Deceased was born in Cayuga on July 27, 1844, being a daughter of Daniel McClung, at that time school master in that town.

In September, 1862, she was married to A. C. Messenger of the Grand River Schem, who died three years later. There was one daughter by this union, Miss Theresa, who died in Welland in 1894.

In 1872 deceased married in Caledonia, William T. Sawle, at that time editor and for some years after, publisher of the Schem. From 1822 to 1885 W. T. Sawle published the Telegraph in Brantford, and in the latter year moved to Welland where he purchased the Telegraph, which he published until his death in 1889. Mrs. Sawle continued the publication of the Telegraph until 1898.

There are three sons and three daughters of this union surviving. They are: G. R. T. Sawle, Welland; C. H. Sawle, publisher Herald, New Hazelton, B.C., and A. L. Sawle, manager of the Northern Trading Co., of Edmonton, Alta.; Mrs. D. S. MacInn, McIvor, Sanguo, Alta.; Miss Annie Nes, Vankleek Hill, Ont.; Mrs. Neil Sawle, Hamilton. The youngest son, Lieut. Wm. T. Sawle was killed in action in 1917. S. B. McClung, of Trenton, is a brother of the deceased and Mrs. J. D. Pennington, Dundas, a sister.

Thirteen years ago deceased moved to Hamilton where she lived with her daughter. She was a member of the Presbyterian church and in her earlier years took an active part in its many organizations.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. W. A. McIlroy, of St. Giles church at the late residence, Hagersville on Saturday afternoon. Interment was in the family plot, Caledonia cemetery, the Rev. N. D. MacKinnon assisting in the service at the grave.

During the service at the home the chimes of St. Giles' played "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" and "One by One." The pallbearers were: Messrs. J. H. Robinson, N. Fitch, J. D. Stewart, Alex Stewart, Peter Smith and J. A. McCutcheon.
