OPPOSE CHANGE IN SCHOOL WORK

The move made by Premier Ferguson, Dr. F. W. Merchant and other provincial education officials, to cut certain subjects deemed non-essential from the school curriculum, is not looked upon with any great favor by some educationalists, especially in the cities. The scheme includes reduction of home work.

The general feeling is that while subjects such as art and nature study were not absolutely essential to the child's education, yet they provided a most welcome and necessary diversion from the regular run of academic work. Hygiene, quoted as one subject which might well be dropped, is considered by board members as being extremely helpful.

As for home work, opinion is that without it the student can not secure a complete education. In the junior classes, it might well be almost unknown, but as the pupil climbs through the higher grades, one hour or an hour and a half were no bother to him. He could play from 3.30 until 7, and then put in some study until bedtime.
