Mr. and Mrs. D. Secord spent Sunday last with Mr. and Mrs. Ira Fischer at Walsingham.

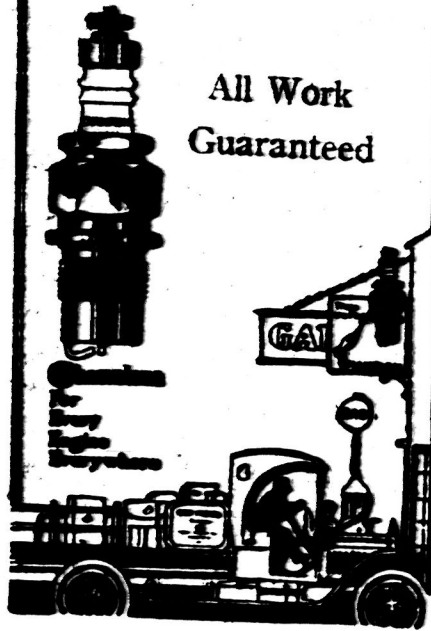
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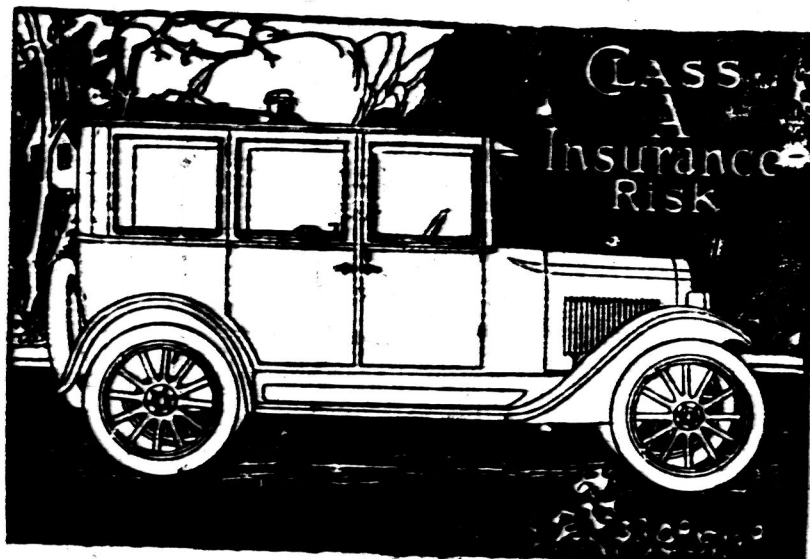

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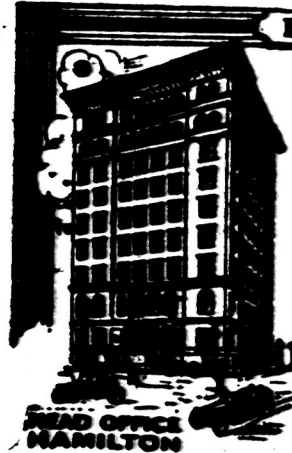
