## URCES ACCOUNT BOOKS ON FARM

### Necessity Is Explained for Men Who Are On The Land

Any merchant handling several different lines of goods would regard it as folly to neglect to keep a complete set of books enabling him at all times to ascertain his profits and losses on the various commodities he sells, his assets and liabilities, and so on. A manufacturer who failed to do so would be heading for insolvency. It is curious, then, that Canada's basic industry—agriculture—should be carried on, so far as individual producers are concerned with it, in so casual a manner with regard to account-keeping. Especially is this strange when it is considered how simple farm book-keeping is by comparison with that of other businesses.

In a survey of some eight-hundred farms conducted some time ago it was discovered that very few farmers indeed followed anything like a complete method of accounting, while a large number adopted absolutely none at all. These, beyond having a sort of general idea as to "what paid," were often quite hazy as to actual returns from different lines of work.

In order, if possible, to remedy this undesirable state of affairs the Dominion Experimental Farms system has published an extremely simple farmer's account book, which will adequately serve all necessary purposes. In size and thickness it is no larger than a school exercise book, and is designed to last a complete year. To "keep" it needs no knowledge of ordinary accounting; simply the ability to write and add; and a record of all transactions might be made in an hour a week. A few plain directions as to making entries, some aids in taking inventories, a table of silo capacities and a gestation table, are given on the inside of the cover, while on the back are printed calendars for last, this and next year.

In the book itself are pages for the entry of receipts and expenditures (both of which may be seen at a glance on the same page) relative to cattle, horses, sheep, swine, poultry, crops and labour; and there is also ample space for miscellaneous items. There is a page for accounts owed to and by the farm, and forms on which may be made inventories of land and buildings, of live stock, of feed and supplies, and of machinery. Following is a page on which may be filled out a summary of the year's business, together with a few directions necessary to filling it out intelligently at the end of the year. Further, for the farmer's information there is a table in which to enter acreage and yield of crops, and one in which to keep a live stock service record.

The whole thing has been reduced to the simplest possible terms, and should prove, to the general farmer, one of the most useful publications issued from the Experimental Farms for some time. It should be recognized that farming is a business, the same as any other. If a business is not paying, the owner of it wants to know why it is not doing so. This little book will enable the farmer to keep an accurate record of each department of his business, find out how much he is making from each, or how little, and so be able to adjust matters accordingly.

## ENDING OF COAL STRIKE.

Trying to Save Consumers Extra Cost on Anthracite.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 10.—Representatives of anthracite operators and miners Saturday night agreed upon the terms of a proposed new two-year wage contract. The union scale committee immediately approved the agreement and fixed September 17 as the date for a tri-district convention at Scranton, at which it will be submitted for ratification by the miners.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 10.—Having, by his proposals, paved the way for the ending of the coal strike, Governor Pinchot yesterday took steps which he believes will result in preventing anthracite users from being forced to pay the added cost due to the 10 per cent. increase in miners' wages at the eight-hour day agreed on by the representatives of the operators and miners. The Governor made known his plan in a letter to President Coolidge.

Stating that he was preparing to initiate the Governors of all anthracite-using states to take up local margins and profits of wholesalers, brokers, jobbers and retailers, that he would ask the Pennsylvania Public Service Commission to reconsider the reasonableness of all freight rates on anthracite, Governor Pinchot suggested that the Interstate Commerce Commission should consider a new anthracite freight rate, and that the United States Coal Commission make public its findings on profits and costs of mine operations and wholesale and retail distribution.

## TO STOP RUN-RUNNING.

Ottawa and Washington Hold Conference to Stop Smuggling.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—As the result of correspondence between Secretary Hughes and Ambassador Geddes, representing the British Government in Washington, on a proposal that the Canadian Government shall co-operate with the United States authorities by prohibiting illegal shipments of liquor from Canada, the Canadian Government has proposed that this Government send a representative to Ottawa to discuss ways and means of assisting the United States in preventing smuggling.

This Government has appointed McKenna Moss, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, to attend the conference in Ottawa. The Canadian Government has not fixed a time for this meeting.

If direct co-operation can be brought about by which the Canadian authorities will prohibit the shipment of liquors from Canada to the United States without a permit from this Government, it is believed that one great source of bootlegging and smuggling of liquors will be stopped.

### Sacrifices His Life.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—Rene Viau of this city was almost instantly killed Saturday evening on the Aymer road, near Hull, in an accident in which he practically sacrificed his own life to save that of Roland Whitmore of Vel Tetreau, a young boy, who escaped unscathed.

Mr. Viau was travelling on his motorcycle when young Whitmore suddenly ran out into the road. Mr. Viau, with no time to stop, swung his machine to the left, and it slipped on the greasy asphalt, throwing him heavily to the road. He died before he could receive medical assistance. Mr. Viau had been married only about two weeks.

Another accident occurred Saturday afternoon when Waldo Gould, driving an automobile, struck and seriously injured Jean Paul Chart, a young boy, who suffered a fractured leg, in attempting to avoid another boy, Philomen Sabourin of Hull, who was also injured.

### Robbers Take Safe.

OWEN SOUND, Ont., Sept. 10.—Early Sunday morning the bakery and confectionery store of W. J. Holmes in Owen Sound's main business district was broken into and the small safe in the store carried off bodily. The rear door of the store was forced open, and a second door leading into the main store was opened by means of removing the hinges, the screws being carefully taken out and carried away. It must have required two or three men at least to move the small safe, which weighed about four hundred pounds. The loss was discovered about eight o'clock, when the front door was found open. The burglar will get very little reward for their labors when they succeed in getting it open, for there was only \$15 and some cents in it.

### Greatest Trade In Years.

REGINA, Sept. 10.—Following the influx of harvesters to the province, wholesale houses report that orders for merchandise are pouring into Regina in a volume equalling the peak trade of the boom days.

Import houses are being rushed with orders, and wholesale grocery firms report the greatest trade in years.

### Provides His First Story.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 10.—Harold M. Andrews, recently appointed correspondent of a local newspaper at Transcona, Man., committed suicide by touching a live wire on a transmission line on Saturday. In a note to his wife Andrews said his last and was his first report to the newspaper which employed him.

### Plane Stops to Norway Vich.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—The Viking Viking flying boat, which left the Rockliffe airbase on Friday for Victoria Beach, Lake Winnipeg, reported last night by officials of the Air Board to have stopped at Norway Bay owing to the unsatisfactory visibility. The hydroplane proceeded on Saturday.
