ROUP AND CHICKEN POX

These Contagious Diseases of Poultry May Be Cured.

Prompt Treatment Will Save the Birds—Can Be Cured in Ten to Twenty Days—Not Communicable to Men or Other Animals.

In the last few years the treatment of disease among poultry has received much study and many of the older ideas have been revised. Birds respond well to proper medicinal and hygienic treatment; in fact in many cases they show remarkable powers of reserve and resistance, thus comparing very favorably with other domesticated animals. The idea that it is useless to try and treat a sick fowl is erroneous.

Last winter the Ontario Veterinary College carried out a number of experiments regarding the treatment and cure of roup. These tests established the fact that in many cases the disease could be controlled and the birds returned to usefulness in from 10 to 20 days.

Roup a Contagious Disease.

Roup is a contagious disease that attacks the mouth, nasal passages, and eyes of fowl. The causative agent or germ has not yet been certainly demonstrated. This disease spreads rapidly through the flock, being favored by damp, cold, dark quarters, and for this reason roup is most prevalent during the winter months. The lesions in the mouth take the form of masses of yellow cheesy material which has a characteristic offensive odor. The nasal chambers and nostrils become plugged with exudates so that the bird is forced to breathe through the mouth, hence the bill remains open and breathing is often difficult. The eyes become inflamed and filled with a liquid discharge which later becomes thick and cheesy and completely fills the eye cavity. Often the whole side of the head is swollen and when both eyes are involved the bird is blind.

Treatment of the Disease.

The sick birds must be removed from the flock and placed in dry, light and moderately warm quarters. It is useless to try and carry out any treatment unless this is done. Give opening medicine such as Ipecac in dissolved in the drinking water, about a quarter of a pound for every twenty-five birds; give for one day and repeat in a week. Catch each bird and proceed as follows: Remove all cheesy material from mouth and nostrils using a small pair of forceps or tweezers, scrape the sore places well. Don't be afraid of a little blood, but be sure and get down to healthy tissue. Dress mouth with a three per cent. solution of iodine; swab out well. If bird swallows a little of the solution it will do no harm. The nasal lesions should be treated by injecting a warm solution of boric acid, about one teaspoonful to a teacup of water. Use a small syringe to force solution up nostrils. The eyes should be treated with the boric acid solution. Wash out the eyes well and open up the lids if they are stuck together. Sometimes the whole eye cavity is filled with a thick cheesy material; remove this by pressure and the aid of the forceps. In severe eye cases a few drops of iodine solution may be used without ill effects. These eye lesions are often difficult to treat.

The above treatment is somewhat drastic and will take a little time, say three minutes for each bird, but if followed out faithfully and given trial in suitable quarters it will be found to clear up most cases of roup in two or three treatments which should be given every other day. It has been found that the average cast of roup will clear up in about ten days and that soon thereafter the birds will commence laying again. Birds that have recovered from roup do not take the disease again.

Chicken Pox May Develop.

Another condition which may appear along with roup or as an independent disease, is the so called chicken pox, in which scabs and sores form on the wattles, combs and eyelids. The lesions are often about the size of a five cent piece and commence as small light raised areas that exude a thin discharge and soon become converted into crust like scabs. This condition is quite contagious and requires prompt treatment to control. Catch the bird, and with a small rather dull knife scrape off the lesions until healthy tissue is reached. Don't be afraid of blood. Scrape well, then dress with iodine solution rubbed in well over entire head and wattles. Three or four treatments every other day will clean up most cases. Give birds opening medicine and remove from flock during treatment. Birds that recover from chicken pox are immune from further attacks. It is most essential to remove any illing birds from the flock and it should be remembered that the discharges from the lesions carry infection so that all soiled litter and dead birds should be burnt.

These Diseases Spread by Contact.

Roup and chicken pox spread from bird to bird by actual contact. Often the first case is introduced into a flock by the purchase of birds from infected premises or by handling of birds by a person who has recently been in contact with affected birds, or on the shoes or clothing. The best way to prevent roup is to preserve cleanliness in poultry runs and houses; to watch the flock carefully and at once remove and treat sick birds. It is advisable that the person who treats the sick fowls should recognize that he is dealing with a very contagious disease and should change outer clothing, clean boots and wash hands thoroughly before going among the flock, especially young chicks. Neither roup or chicken pox are communicable to man or any other animal.

All Records Broken.

TORONTO, Sept. 10.—The world has paid its tribute to Canada's National Fair. One more record has been added to the tale of steady growth. One million four hundred and ninety-three thousand people passed through the turnstiles of the Exhibition during the two weeks of this year—seven thousand, only, short of the million and a half. Each day but one of this year's Exhibition saw a decided gain. A total increase of 120,500 over the attendance figures for 1922 records the growing popularity of the Big Fair.

With weather conditions far from favorable, Saturday brought an increase in attendance over the last day of 1922 of 18,000, when 153,000 people celebrated sports and community day at the Exhibition. Morning sunshine darkened to a heavy downpour at noon, but the weatherman recovered from his temporary discouragement, and a bright afternoon drew a huge throng.

Earthquake Registered at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—A report issued from the Dominion Observatory at the Central Experimental Farm was to the effect that an earthquake of moderate intensity was registered on the seismograph here Sunday afternoon. The preliminary tremors arrived at 5.15 a.m., 22 minutes, 30 seconds, Eastern Standard time, and the distance to the epicentre was 6,280 kilometers, or 3,900 miles. The tremors continued for about two and a half hours.

No Embargo on Canadian Cattle.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—Canadian store cattle are being admitted at British ports as usual and there has not been any question of embargo or quarantine against them. This was confirmed by the cable received yesterday by the Department of Agriculture from the High Commissioner's Office in London.

Sir Campbell Stuart in Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—Sir Campbell Stuart, K.B.E., managing director of the London Times, a Canadian, arrived in Ottawa, Saturday.
