### SASK. MOST NORTHERN SETTLEMENT



Recalling the days of a century and a half ago, when the Hudson's Bay Company and the North West Company were contending for the wealth of northern Canada, the little post of Fond du Lac on Lake Athabasca, seven hundred miles north of the boundary lines. It was the famous explorer, Samuel Hearne, who was the first white man on Lake Athabasca, on which this post is situated. He was returning from his discovery of the Coppermine River, and his expedition to the shores of the Arctic ocean, seeking the Northwest Passage, when Hearne was led by Indians to Lake Athabasca. He claimed the territory between it and the Arctic for the Hudson's Bay Company. The Fond du Lac post today still carries on the traditions of the great trading company in the vast fur lands of the north.

## Favorite Hymns

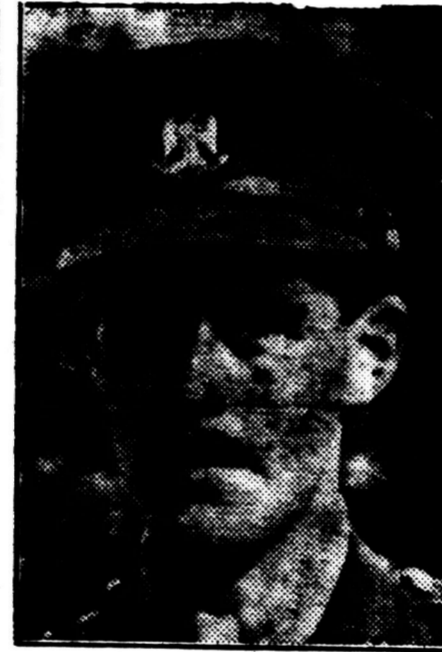
### "HARK, THE SOUND OF HOLY VOICES"

We all have our favorite hymns,

worth, Bishop of Lincoln. He was a  
poet born, being the nephew of Wil-  
liam Wordsworth. I like to think of  
him—of his ripe scholarship, his  
beautiful and simple piety, his un-  
tiring labors. He rose at five o'clock  
in the morning, answering all letters  
himself, and going to every parish  
in his enormous diocese.

### SELLS HIS PENSION



LORD RODNEY, the famous  
Admiral Rodney of British his-  
tory, was granted a pension of  
\$2,000 a hundred and forty years  
ago, the pension to be perpetual  
to his heirs. Lord Rodney, the  
holder of the title today, is a  
Canadian rancher, who lives in  
Alberta. He has just commuted  
the pension for a lump sum of  
\$42,000. There is now just one  
perpetual pensioner. He is Ad-  
miral Nelson's heir, Lord Nelson,  
who receives \$5,000 a year.

congregation there is still no better  
hymn than his—full, rich, and gen-  
erous as a vintage wine—the ulma-  
giving hymn, the hymn of charity,  
the hymn of harvest—  
"O Lord of heaven and earth and  
sea,  
To Thee all praise and glory be;  
How shall we show our love to Thee  
Who givest all?"

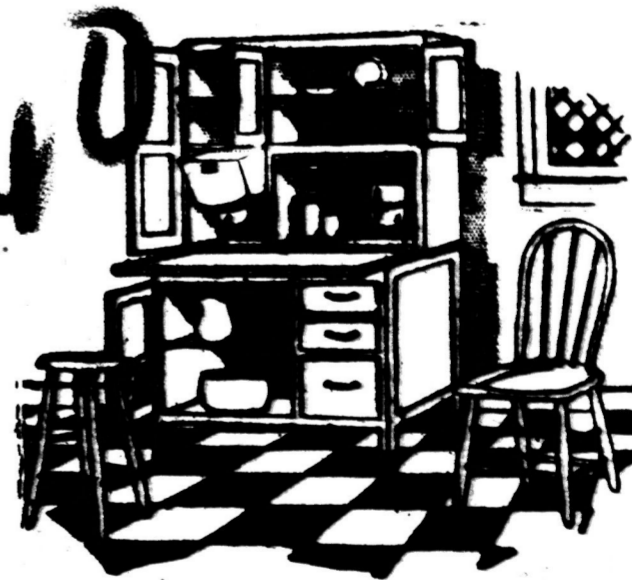
