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## HALDIMAND COUNTY WINTER SHORT COURSES

TO BE HELD AT CAYUGA AT THE TOWN HALL AND THE COURT HOUSE IN JAN.

- 1.—Agriculture—Court House, January 5 to 30.
- 2.—Swine Marketing—Court House, January 8 and 9.
- 3.—Sheep Marketing—Court House, January 20 and 21.
- 4.—Household Science—Town Hall, January 5 to 16.
- 5.—Nursing—Town Hall, January 19 to 30.

A brief outline of the course in Agriculture is:—Lectures on Live Stock, Feeds and Feeding, Farm Crops, Poultry, Dairying, Fertilizers and Manure, Weeds and Weed Seeds, Fruit and Vegetable Growing, Farm Bookkeeping and Arithmetic, Veterinary Science, Plant Diseases and Destructive Insects, Co-operation and Markets, and Public Speaking. Special lectures will be given on Pests, Fruit, Veterinary Science, Markets and Co-operation. Demonstrations will be given wherever applicable and as frequently as possible.

A brief outline of the course in Swine Marketing is:—Lectures and Demonstrations on grading Canadian Wiltshires for the British Market; Cutting Demonstrations; Demonstration on type and conformation in breeding stock; Judging Class of Brood Sows; Hog Grading Demonstration; Discussion of Market Grades with special reference to conformation, breeds and finish; Discussion on Hog Marketing Problems and Methods of Sale; Lectures on Breeding to get Select Bacon Hogs; Growing and Finishing Select Bacon Hogs; Feeds for Economy in Pork Production.

A brief outline of the Sheep Marketing course is:—Lectures and Demonstrations on handling sheep, weighing, throwing, leading, hollering, crumming; Sheep Halters, Blankets; Selecting Sheep for Breeding; Purposes; Sheep Problems connected with dogs, fences and pastures; Judging Market Lambs; Procedure of Lamb Sale at Stock Yards; Mock Auction of Market Lambs; Sheep Shearing Demonstration; Demonstration of Slaughtering and Dressing; Lamb and Wool Markets; Demonstration—Post Mortem, examination of organs from lambs slaughtered; Sheep Hips and Dipping, why and how; Demonstration—Commercial Grading of Lamb Carcasses; Demonstration—Lamb Cuts and their respective value; Wool Grading Demonstration; the Purebred Ram in relation to Market Type Lambs.

The Household Science Course will be conducted by Miss Marion Robertson, Walkerton, Ont. A brief outline of the course is:—Food Values in relation to Health; Practical Demonstrations in preparing and cooking; Vegetables, Fruits, Cereals and Cheese, Meats, Salads, Desserts, Menu-planning, Table Setting and Servicing.

The Nursing Course will be conducted by Miss Mary Slater, Kitchener. A brief outline of the course is:—General Instructions for Daily Health and Hygiene; Symptoms; Preventative Measures. First Aid in Fractures, Dislocations, Wounds, Hemorrhage; Practice in Bandaging; Artificial Respiration, Baths and Packs; Taking Temperature, pulse and respiration; Equipping the Sick Room; Disinfectants, etc.

### AT THE COUNTY COURT

The regular sitting of the County Court and General Session of the Peace opened at Cayuga on Wednesday, December 10th.

There are only two cases entered for trial and they are both non-jury cases. There are no criminal cases to be tried and no civil cases to be tried by a jury. Both the Grand Jury and the Petit Jury were called.

One of the cases entered on the list is an action brought by S. J. McCammon, of Hamilton against the County of Haldimand. On Sunday, the 9th day of Sept., 1923, about noon, the plaintiff was driving up the River Road just after a heavy shower of rain. As the plaintiff was approaching the bridge on the highway on the other side of the farm of Leslie Old, the plaintiff's car left the road and skidded and the two north-erly wheels went over the side of the bridge and struck a tree which held the automobile from going over. The plaintiff claimed that his car was damaged to the extent of \$500 and has brought action against the County for this amount. It is understood that the plaintiff intends to withdraw the case.
