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\$4,000 RAISED TO ADVERTISE SOUTHERN ONTARIO PROJECT

At a meeting in St. Thomas last week, members of the Southern Ontario Highway Association unanimously passed a resolution petitioning the Dominion Government to undertake before next year a comprehensive publicity campaign in the United States in order to develop the automobile tourist traffic from that country to Canada to the limit.

The preamble of the resolution deals with the importance of this new industry and the amount of money that is annually left in Canada by motorists, and also with the wonderful natural attractions of this country.

The meeting was by far the most enthusiastic and largely attended since the inception of the association to boost the beautiful drive across Ontario that skirts the north shore of Lake Erie, almost every municipality along the route being represented.

At the last meeting a campaign for funds was instituted, and canvassing teams reported approximately \$4,000 of the \$5,000 required as being raised and the remainder in sight. Leamington, Kingsville, Blenheim, Aylmer and Tilsonburg all reported that their quotas were raised with little difficulty.

Not only are towns and villages on the southern highway joining the movement, but places that are off the main road as well.

The meeting arranged to have a special meeting held at Dunnville or Cayuga in a few days in order to get the pieces on the extreme east end of the route interested. Organization was completed by the election of a combined Executive and Publicity Committee. It consists of the following: St. Thomas, Alderman Harding and Meehan, and D. H. McIntyre, secretary-treasurer of the association; C. H. Denton, of Tilsonburg; C. A. Austin, of Simcoe; Mayor R. H. Coulter, Cayuga; Mayor Selkirk, of Leamington; Mayor W. M. Webb, of Kingsville; J. D. Coyle, of Aylmer, vice-president of the association; C. W. McPherson, Blenheim, vice-president; C. H. Naylor, Essex, and T. J. Hedley, Morpeth.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST ADDRESSES GATHERING

M. BALDENSPERGER GIVES AN INTERESTING TALK AT THE RECTORY ON PALESTINE

At the Rectory on Thursday evening last, the young people of St. Paul's were entertained by M. Baldensperger, a distinguished gentleman from France, who was appointed by his government to represent France at the seventh World's Congress of Beekeepers, held at Quebec during September last. Since then, this noted naturalist has addressed students of Apiculture at Cornell University, attended conventions, and visited prominent beekeepers in various parts of the United States and Canada.

Before sailing for France, M. Baldensperger spent a few days with Mr. Arthur Hodgson, who introduced the speaker, who then gave a very realistic talk on Palestine, for although of Alsatian parentage, he was born in Jerusalem, and was there baptised and confirmed by the Anglican Bishop.

M. Baldensperger is a gifted linguist, speaking Arabic, French, Italian, German and English.

In a delightfully interesting way he depicted the manners and customs of the Holy Land, as only one familiar with its life could do. Many apparently obscure passages of Scripture unfolded their meaning and became beautifully clear when seen through the eyes of the East. Stories taken from actual life were told, illustrating the great fact of history, that Jerusalem is the Holy City, alike to Jew, Mohammedan and Christian. Much was said on this point, for these three opposing forces have been in ruthless conflict all down the centuries, blindly forgetting that the very meaning of Jerusalem is "peace." The speaker became touchingly eloquent in pleading for that which seeks to make all men brothers.

"For Zion's sake I will not hold my peace, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest, until the righteousness of her go forth as brightness, and the salvation thereof as a lamp that burneth."

Archdeacon Irving, on behalf of those present, thanked M. Baldensperger for his very interesting and instructive address.
