

If rolls are served, a roll and a pat kept in a stone jar. of butter are placed on a small plate and served to each person. Apple stuce and cranberry jelly is served in small individual dishes. Pickles are placed on the plate with the rest of the food. A small piece of cheese is placed on the plate with a serving of apple pie. Many dishes can be prepared at home and either kept hot in a fireless cooker or reheated just before serving.

A nice chicken supper consists of brown fricassee of chicken, peas (fresh or canned), mashed potatoes, celery, sweet pickles, rolls or waffles and maple syrup, lemon sponge pie, tes and coffee. If you use a breadmixer for mashing large quantities of totatoes you will find that the potawill be much lighter.


