BEER SALE IN HOTELS

Asserting that under present conditions it was almost impossible to operate a standard hotel on a self-sustaining business, two hundred members of the Hotel Association of Ontario waited upon Premier Ferguson and members of the Ontario cabinet recently, asking that standard hotels be given the right to sell native wine and beer with meals, and beer at tables not accompanied by meals. The beer, it was suggested by the deputation, should not be over two and one-half per cent. alcohol, which is about five per cent. proof spirits and twice the strength of beer allowed to be sold under the present provincial law.

The deputation also asked for exemption from taxation of standard hotels for a period of ten years, the licensing of restaurants, lunch counters, rooming houses, etc., and that those competing businesses be subject to the same strict governmental inspection as the standard hotel. They also protested strongly against "unfair competition" from tourist camps and camping sites, asking that these be placed in the same position as transient traders, who are required by most municipalities to pay a heavy license fee.

"This is one of the most important problems we have to deal with in political life," Premier Ferguson told the deputation after he had heard their various speeches. "There is no doubt in the world that the hotel is a public utility, and must be regarded in that light. With a number of the statements you have made this government is in accord, but in other matters difficulties arise. But two matters which you have mentioned seem to me to have been properly stressed, and justify some measure of relief. They are the tourists camps, and the operation of restaurants by Greeks, and other recent arrivals in this country. A good deal can be done to overcome this situation, and I think you will find the government prepared to cooperate with you in that."

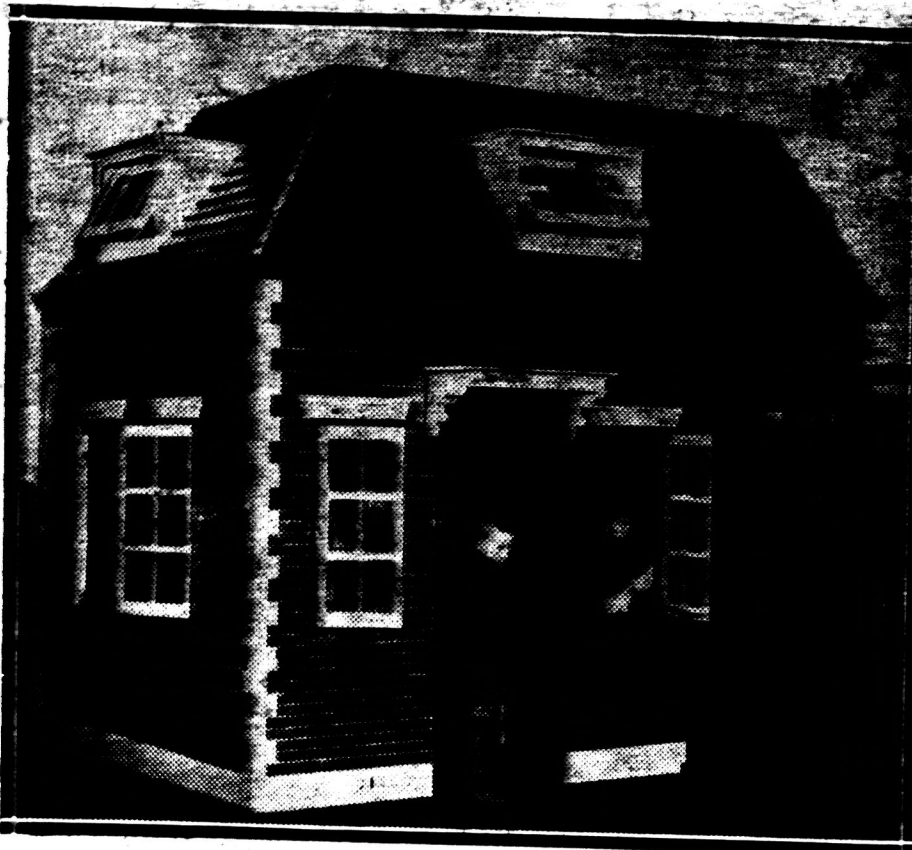
"She Was Too Sick To Try Entrance Exams"
